

1. WELCOME

Brian Switzer called the meeting to order at 11:35 a.m.

A couple of Sundays ago Ingrid and I arrived home after looking after the grandkids for two exhausting weeks. All we wanted to do was sit back, put our feet up and watch the Super Bowl. I turned on the TV, It wasn't working. We turned on our computers, they weren't working. I telephoned our service provider, but our land line wasn't working. I finally got through using my cell-phone. After about an hour-and-a- half a technician called me back. The first question he asked was ..."How was I enjoying the game?" I won't share with you my response!

We can communicate in so many different ways through a seemingly endless variety of social media sites. But you know that things can go wrong, and they do: connections break, systems fail, hacking occurs. They say more than 3,000 companies in the US alone were victims of a cyber attack last year.

But you know that today, here in our church, this morning, we have used the greatest means of communication known to mankind on at least a half dozen occasions. This means of communication has been around for over 2,000 years. It has never been hacked. We never receive the message — the server has stopped responding, or the server does not recognize the user. You know I'm talking about prayer. It is interesting that they say the only specific request the disciples made of Jesus was: "teach us to pray". (Luke 11:1). They noticed that when he prayed he got what he prayed for. He wanted radiance, power to live at his best, and the opportunity to serve people to the utmost. His prayers were answered. So his disciples said "teach us to pray."

As you read through the various Ministry reports, prayer was used to deliver the programs, raise the necessary funds, make the needed decisions, and to overcome the obstacles. 7. TREASURER'S REPORT

Barbara Carington Smith did a power point presentation first outlining the 2014 financial challenges which started in January 2014 with the rectory septic tank and upgrades, and the electrical power line problems from storm damage. A CRA audit in May, clergy study leave, staff changes (Les' retirement), an extraordinary bequest, anxiety related to a large deficit and how we recovered to end with a surplus.

She then reviewed the Statement of Financial Position on screen with a detailed explanation of the cash and investment balances, pointing out and explaining the restricted items and the structure.

She then moved to the Statement of Changes in Net Assets to review the balance of the various funds for capital as well as the ministry programs. It is important to know that the reserve for the operating is only \$16,942.31 at year end. To have a deficit more than that amount would require the use of other reserved funds. Cash flow management was discussed, and a reminder that contributions did not meet our budget commitment on a monthly basis and the biggest cause for the large deficits seen during the year.

Barbara assured all that there are management controls in place to ensure fiscal responsibility. She also made an appeal for contributions to be more consistent monthly.

In reviewing the Statement of Parish Operations with a surplus of \$881.65, it was noted that December brought in an amazing total revenue of \$68,000.00. Acknowledgement was given for this huge out-pouring of generosity from individuals as well as all the ministries and the time and talent given as well. Quoting Matthew 6:21 "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also".

Besides the operating budget more than \$5,000 was received for capital and \$55,000 to Ministry Programs and Outreach Programs. As well a total of \$429,117.38 in bequests was received.

The CRA audit has brought it to our attention the importance of using our correct legal name – **PARISH OF ST.**MARK – OCEAN PARK. Barbara reminded everyone to ensure all cheques are made payable as required by the CRA.

Barbara asked for questions from the floor and these were answered.

MOVED BY BARBARA CARINGTON SMITH, SECONDED BY ART GO THAT THAT TREASURER'S REPORT BE ACCEPTED AS PRESENTED. CARRIED.

8. 2015 BUDGET

2014 Actual Compared to Budget was reviewed noting that all departments and areas of the 2014 Budget were on target with very little variance, this being an indication of the realistic forecast of our operating expenses. Barbara then presented the 2015 Budget noting the few areas of changes and the reasons for the changes. The Envelope – Maintenance Operating Budget remains the same as 2014 at \$380,706.00.

Brian Switzer was invited to comment on Building and Maintenance and noted that steps are being taken to compile a monthly maintenance schedule to routinely check areas such as the septic tank, roofing etc. A review of all systems, practices and procedures is also underway with Don Hamilton and Ken Miles volunteering their time and talents, and their considerable experience, to include review of all maintenance procedures, purchase agreements and energy consumption, and to co-ordinate custodial staff. The anticipated outcome is that considerable savings will be realized in the future. Finally, a contingency fund is to be established to provide for long range maintenance planning.

Hearing no questions from the floor, MOVED BY BARBARA CARINGTON SMITH, SECONDED BY JANET SCOTT that the Budget for 2015 be accepted as presented. CARRIED.

9. ACCEPTANCE OF 2014 ANNUAL REPORT

Rev. Craig Tanksley noted one correction to Page 29 of the Annual Report 2014, fourth paragraph, line 3: emergency rector expenses corrected to read EMERGENCY RECTORY EXPENSES.

10. NEW BUSINESS

St. Mark Ocean Park Nominee for the Order of the Diocese of New Westminster in 2015: Rev. Craig announced that nominations were requested and considered by Clergy and Wardens and brought to Parish Council. Craig is delighted that Olive Pociwauschek has accepted, although she was surprised and clearly wishes it to be known that her accomplishments are largely due to "team work." Olive thanks all those who volunteer their time and talents in support of her initiatives.

11. RECTOR'S REPORT

We have so much to be thankful for today. We can celebrate another good year at St. Marks Church. Another year where we have worshipped God, preached and taught the Word, celebrated our faith, cared for one another pastorally and reached out to our community in gifts and works of compassion. Much of it is here in these written reports. Today I want you to know how very grateful I am personally and all of us are for the hard work and service of many people. For our gifted and hard-working staff, our wardens, our Parish Council and our ministry leaders. And we are grateful for every act of hidden service which is known only by God. Today we are grateful that there are leaders, elected and appointed, who are willing to serve us again this year. Who will give their life, their time and talent in service to all of us. This is a great gift.

Today we are also grateful for the generous and sacrificial giving on the part of many people. Today, against the odds of a large deficit toward the end of the year, we have a positive balance in our accounts. It was a bit harrowing but we came through. Someone said to me, in the midst of our struggle at the end of the year, "Don't tell me that God will supply our needs because ultimately we are the ones who have to give the money." That is true. But really, both of those things are true. We give the money, generously and faithfully

to God. But the very fact that we are able to give, that we have something available to give, that we are even interested and willing to give, those things come from God. And God has supplied every need. That doesn't mean that we move ahead without caution. I think that our deficit was a yellow flag saying be careful. Be careful about how you use these valuable resources because they are given through sacrifice. That is why we have put forward a budget with no frills. May every dollar in this budget be given and spent to the glory of God!

Today I am looking ahead to the future. And I am wondering what kind of future is in store for us? If we stand on the mountain with God and we look to the other side, what will we see? What would we hope to see? If it is true that it takes the partnership of both God and God's people to meet the financial needs and goals of our parish, does it not then also mean that it takes both God and God's people, working together, to make the future?

Here is one possible future for us. We maintain the status quo as we slowly grow older. We care for our seniors and run our programs as long as we can sustain it. When we run out of leaders and resources we close them down. Then we will surely follow the pathway of so many churches across North America that lose their energy, their people and die. When I stand upon the mountain, that is not the future I want to see. What do you want to see? What does God want for us? Maybe it is time to dream some new dreams. It is not my job as your Rector, to tell you what the future holds for us. This is something that we have to discover together with God's help and wisdom. If it is a future worth having it will take vision, courage, hard work and sacrifice.

I want to leave you with this challenge, let us walk forward this year in an attitude of listening to each other and seeking the will and purpose of God. Let us be ready and willing to let God show us new things on the mountain, a new vision, new directions, and to be transformed as a church into the future he wants for us.

RECTOR'S REPORT

Lamentations 3:22 & 23 says, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness."

Truly we have known the faithfulness of God in 2015. It has been a full and blessed year for us. We have experienced God's blessing in all of our service and outreach ministries together. God has provided us with strong and faithful leaders. Through the faithful and generous giving of many people, God has sustained us financially.

As I look back over the year, I see a church planted in South Surrey, spreading its branches to do the work of God. We are baptizing (5), marrying (2) and burying (14) the saints of God. We are teaching children, training youth and encouraging adults to be disciples of Christ. We are worshipping, praying for one another and caring for the aged and infirm. We are reaching outward in loving acts and giving to the needy in our community. We are encouraging the saints to be saints in the world where they live; in their neighbourhoods, workplaces and families. All this and more is the work which God has given us to do and our "Raison D'être."

We see the faithfulness of God in signs of renewed life. There are new families among us this year. There are new leaders taking the helm of ministries like the Men's Club and Sunday School. There is the beginning of a brand new ministry to young adults in the form of a Bible study that has been meeting in the home of Heather Davies.

We see new Asian friends who have come to us through Holly's ESL Bible study. Recently we baptized four people from China who have decided to follow Christ. Praise the Lord! Rev. Roger Simpson spent a weekend with us in March to remind us that we must always be looking outward in mission. Of all the things that we do together, that is our first and primary task.

With all the new faces and families we must work at practising hospitality. These new people and families need relationships and connections within our parish. Please go meet them and talk to them when you see them standing alone in the coffee hour.

Our worship and preaching ministry has been strong this year. Our choir has raised the bar in its monthly offering of gorgeous anthems. We have seen an increased use of our praise team and our music has been lively and up-lifting.

Our worship has been further enriched through the launching of our newly renovated outdoor chapel in its forested setting surrounded by a cathedral of trees.

Our purpose within the diocese has perhaps never been stronger with several of our members who are active in Diocesan ministries. Did you know, for example, that Pauline Blachford is co-chairing a ministry called the "Bishop's Friends?" Rev. John and Dorothy Mash are the appointed chaplains to the retired clergy in the diocese. This year we hosted a diocesan led anti-racism conference at St. Mark's. I continue to serve the diocese as a Regional Dean offering pastoral care and support to the clergy within our newly named "Peace Arch Deanery."

We are currently piloting a brand new diocesan program, still in its infancy that we might call something like, "Retired Deacon In Residence." Retired Deacon Stephen Bailey, along with his wife Pamela, have made their home among us for a season in part to help us learn more about the Diaconal ministry.

We finished the year on a high note with nearly 500 people in attendance on Christmas Eve and a five-year high in visitors at the Journey of Christmas.

As we enter a new year, our church has entered a period of intense transition. We have lost two outstanding members of our leadership team. Rev. Denise Doerksen has decided to move on, seeking her own parish. She has already been placed by the bishop in an interim ministry where her considerable gifts will be put to good service. Remember that God is faithful. God is providing for us again through the ministry of a known and trusted friend. Rev. John Mash has accepted an offer to take on a quarter-time ministry to help us with worship, preaching and pastoral care. It will be good once again to have John's experienced and positive leadership on board.

We have also said farewell to an amazingly gifted choir director, whom God raised up from among us, Janet Rendell. She and Tim have taken their retirement on Vancouver Island. We will sorely miss the Rendells, but again the Lord is providing. As I write this report we are preparing to interview a highly qualified candidate whom we hope to be the one the Lord is providing for us.

Our Strategic Planning Team will be working with us this year to answer three important questions; Who are we? Who is our neighbour? and What does God want us to do?

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Two wonderful new programs will be offered during the weeks of Lent. On Sunday evenings there will be a time for silent prayer and reflection led by one of our members, Rev. Scott Tolhurst. Also, Rev. Stephen Bailey will be teaching a six week series in Anglican formation called, "Living The Anglican Way; A Lenten Journey."

Finally, as we begin the new year we are preparing to reach out and offer support and hospitality to a Syrian refugee family.

God has been faithful to us. As we look ahead to a new year we know that the Lord will continue to show us His provision and mercies for they are new every morning. Great is God's faithfulness!

Ministry Reflection Rev. Denise Doerksen - Assistant Priest

Hello parishioners of St. Mark's Ocean Park, The events described below are but some highlights of the way in which I have passed each month with you in 2015. What I have chosen to reflect on is meant to help you consider the ways in which St. Mark's has grown because we have shared ministry together since I came in September 2013. The events and experiences that I don't note below were nonetheless vital, like praying, planning liturgies and officiating for them, and the numerous conversations of a pastoral and spiritual nature you sought me out to have.

January Children and adults dressed up like kings and queens and came to the first family dance of the year, in celebration of the Epiphany of the Lord. Some spiritually hungry souls wanted an Alpha course so with Linda Millar's help we ran this course. Several parents and guardians were keen to have their children grow in spiritual understanding of the Eucharist, so it was with joy and energy that I ran the Life in the Eucharist program. Two young boys began their baptismal journey with me. And I continued to be shaped by my spiritual direction training as I sought spiritual direction personally, offered it to other companions on the way and did my coursework.

February The Alpha course continued. The baptismal journey of two children culminated in their baptism in a dynamic intergenerational service. One of the participants of the Alpha course was also baptized on that day. During Lent I organized a day retreat with St. Matthews and taught an evening study on Spiritual direction. I kept up supportive conversations with Josh, our youth leader and the teachers of Sunday School. A young couple began their journey towards the sacrament of marriage by doing marriage preparation with me.

March Godly Play, a way of doing Sunday morning ministry as a worship experience for young children is a passion of mine (as well as the Bishop's). Due to my experience with this program, St. Matthew's and the Diocese asked me to participate in consultative sessions in order to assist parishes in starting it up in their church.

April Parish Council really embraced the idea of doing a parish discernment process. So, I helped them gain some understanding about what that would mean and together we decided upon people to nominate. I went to the Clergy Conference, met with a few people at the 'edge' of our parish, sang for a Holden Evening Prayer service during Holy Week, and did some music planning with Annabelle, Janet and Craig. We had another Intergenerational service on Easter!

May I was sent out by Parish Council to invite nominees to serve as members of the Strategic Planning Group (or Discernment Group). I really enjoyed hearing a variety of people share their passions for the parish. I participated in Diocesan Synod feeling more connected than ever. I went off to Niagara Falls for another study leave for Spiritual Direction Training. I looked forward to seeing my new friends again and was so enriched. Well this month brought about another Intergenerational service and this time it was for Pentecost.

June Of course with Pentecost came the need for another Family Dance. We had a whooping windy good time. I spent more time meeting with various persons related to youth and children ministry, like Josh, as well as Caitlin and others at the Synod office. More time was needed to gather up a group for the Parish Discernment Group. My most memorable moment of the year was the outdoor Intergenerational service in our Chapel-in-the-Woods. I will remember this fondly in years to come; the joyful stillness we felt within the circle of trees...the faces of the children and adults in the arms of the forest. Wow!!

July Did a wedding, a funeral, had a holiday and stayed in touch with Josh.

August This was the month to re-envision Children and Youth Ministry due to leadership changes and our desire to involve kids in service and participation on Sunday mornings. I was lent out to do a Godly Play sermon at St. Matthew's.

September Coordinated and participated in a wonderful retreat at Bethlehem Retreat Centre, Nanaimo. Ministered to folks at Westminster House. Visited a child in need of spiritual conversation. Colled a Youth Retreat with Josh in Hope, B.C. Carel and I did a training session just for a few youth wanting to learn the 'ropes'. Also, got 'Singing Prayers' off the ground. This was the first of three monthly services of Taize style contemplative prayer for all ages.

October Off again for another week of residency at Niagara Falls as a study leave. Went to the Diocesan Anti-racism training in Ladner. Started a Christian Life Group meeting in a home in Walnut Grove. A few of the people on the 'edge' of the parish, (those wanting to know more about the Christian life without regularly attending church) came together to talk about Rowan William's book "Being Christian". At the end of this month came the chance to do another Family dance, this time for the Feast of All Saints!

November Began to prepare a teen for baptism. Went to the Synod office for a meeting to brainstorm about Confirmation. Had another Christian Life Group meeting. Met with a couple on the 'edge' of the church wanting me to officiate for their wedding next year. The bishop has given me permission to do so in an effort to maintain relationship with the ever-changing spiritual ideas and needs of young adults in B.C. today. Bishop Melissa helped me in another way; she helped me discern that it was time for me to move on from St. Mark's and serve somewhere else in the Diocese. I resigned feeling

like I was leaping from one high tower to another one, yet unseen and unknown.

Wardens' Report

As wardens we have tried to practice good stewardship in the administering of our church life in terms of God and his will, as best we understand it. As we entered into 2015, we recalled the passage in **Revelations 3:8, "Behold I have set before thee an open door and no man can shut it."** We prepared to cross that threshold of the new year with gratitude for what the Lord had done for us. The Bible is full of that spirit. Jesus is reported as giving thanks. He took the loaves and gave thanks. He took the cup and gave thanks. His whole life radiated with thankfulness.

We are very thankful for our Maintenance Coordinators, Don Hamilton and Ken Miles who were very active in administrating to the physical needs of our buildings. What follows is a brief highlighting from a prodigious list of accomplishments.

They replaced all church heating thermostats with more sophisticated programmable units that allow for greater savings through more efficient use of temperature control. Temperatures were set in accordance with recognized industry wide standards. The new thermostats could still be manually adjusted to suit the situation, but after a predetermined period the temperature would automatically revert back to the programmed setting, thereby saving energy costs.

They also replaced all incandescent lights in the sanctuary, narthex, family room, and many outside locations with LED lights. Ken explained to Parish Council, who approved the purchase, that while this was an initial investment cost, over time the church would save considerably in replacement costs. As it turned out, the initial cost was largely offset by two generous parishioner donations.

Don and Ken produce a monthly report to Parish Council on the current status of maintenance issues and an updating on anticipated large capital building projects. Ken is also a regular participant before Council providing advice and guidance on these projects and all manner of maintenance issues.

Our Custodial Team of Heather Higginson and Geoff Higginson has done an excellent job of cleaning our church and attending to our janitorial needs. They have also reorganized and reconfigured the Maintenance Room. This included the installation of new shelving and hangers designed for mops and brooms. The Kitchen Committee was very appreciative of their efforts, noting that more safe and usable storage space had been created.

Commencing in early 2015 we experienced a minor rat infestation in the kitchen, adjacent rooms, connecting passageway, and hall areas. Don and Ken made daily inspections of the infected areas and passed on their findings to our professional Pest Care technicians. All possible outside areas of access were sealed, as were all inside access points. Inside traps were set and the bait changed almost weekly. Don and Ken were particularly vigilant in discouraging any possible food substances being left on the kitchen counters. They encouraged and helped draft a new church policy with respect to the proper disposal of organic kitchen materials. Eventually efforts started to pay off and it was estimated that we were rat free by early April.

Also commencing in early January was a massive church-wide initiative to clean up the silverfish infestation. This was under the auspices of Anne Schreck and involved representatives from almost all Parish Ministries. Hours were spent in cleaning and restoring various areas in the church and in replacing cardboard box storage with lidded plastic containers.

In March the Kitchen Committee was formed and 13 representatives of various user groups attended the first meeting. New kitchen policies were discussed plus many ideas for improvements. Roberta Braddock and Isabel Chernoff were elected co-chairpersons of the committee, succeeding Dianne Clou, who finished her three year term as chair. Roberta and Isabel reorganized many aspects of the kitchen layout, including the pantry and hall storage area.

Three metal storage cabinets were purchased by Don and Ken for the proper and secure storage of toxic chemicals, including paint, garden and cleaning supplies. This allowed for the removal of paint stored in the hall and moved to more secure storage in the downstairs furnace room. This also freed storage space in the hall for the Kitchen Committee. One of the metal cabinets was wall mounted in the Pantry for food storage by the Men's Club.

In an effort to reduce paper, photocopier use, and office involvement, we experimented with producing only a digital Parish Pulse which was emailed weekly. A few paper copies were available

Sundays for those without email access. This did not work out as anticipated and we went back to producing the paper copy insert in the Sunday bulletin.

We collected, compiled and corrected parishioners' email addresses and undertook compliance measures in accordance with the Anti-Spam Legislation in updating our parish lists.

Under Denise's guidance Parish Council reflected upon reading "Holly Conversations". The emphasis focused on the questions: "Who we are as a parish?"; "What are we here to do?"; and, "Who is our neighbour?" A Discernment Committee was selected from a list of parishioners approved by Parish Council and chaired by Peter Boorman. Meetings have commenced in an effort to answer these questions.

Rev. Canon Roger Simpson, an evangelist from Northern England was with us March 13th – 15th. He spoke on the topic of "Sharing the Love of Jesus Christ with the people of Ocean Park".

A new wedding brochure/flyer was produced. We developed a template for, and updated the Parish's Memorial Book. We developed a Brochure for the Outdoor Chapel. We posted our 2015 Parish Council's photos and bios in the hall.

We improved our telephone systems, including upgrading the bandwidth for our internet connections. Our church has secured a new internet provider.

In an effort to cut down on the number and length of announcements on Sunday mornings, new guide lines were developed to keep announcements short and interesting. Some church services by their very nature, children and family involvement, take longer, so it was considered important to respect parishioners' time. The new guidelines were passed by Parish Council and a memo sent to all church leaders. A number of groups and individuals expressed their concern over the restrictions. They were told that enforcement of the policy would be at the discretion of the Clergy and Wardens, but would only be exercised in extreme situations where it was clear that things were getting out of hand.

We held two successful concerts, one in February and one in May. The Concert Ministry finished as Debra, Chris and Tim retired from that ministry.

Phil Tubbs built a new lockable kitchen cabinet and a beautiful wood surround for our church altar railing.

Our Bishop, The Right Reverend Melissa M. Skelton, invested our nominee, Olive Pociwauschek, in the Order of the Diocese of New Westminster. The Bishop also invested in the Order of the Diocese, Dorothy Mash, as one of her own nominees. Both individuals are being recognized for their many outstanding years of service to our parish.

A Sexual Misconduct Workshop was conducted by Rich Phillips at the Mount Olive Lutheran Church April 25, under the Screening in Faith requirements.

The proposal by our Music Ministry to embrace the Common Praise Hymnal was enthusiastically supported. This is the official hymnal of the Canadian Anglican Church, and it contains the majority of hymns we sing. Adopting this hymnal will reduce the time and cost of producing our Sunday Bulletins as only the title and numbers need to be printed. In May Craig delivered a liturgy of blessings over the new hymnals. The majority of comments from parishioners were very supportive of the new hymnal.

We developed policies on: "garbage can placement" – in compliance with fire regulations, "food left in the fridge", "hall set up and take down", and "use of the Narthex".

Probably the most serious building issue we faced this past year was what we will categorize as our "rental (old rectory) water situation". On a couple of occasions our tenants reported a considerable decrease in their water pressure and volume. Fortunately the situation somehow rectified itself within a few hours or days. We did however feel it prudent to determine the source and location of the rental water in case the decrease happened again and the situation did not fortuitously self-correct. If we knew the location of the water line we could initiate the necessary repairs.

We had always assumed that the source of the rental water was the church itself. This proved not to be the case as demonstrated when our plumbers turned off the church's water, but that of the rental residence continued to flow. In an effort to resolve the issue we consulted what old building records we could find, all relevant city records, and held discussions with parishioners involved in our building

construction. We attempted to trace the water line through high technology solutions such as water ionization. We even dug a number of trenches in relevant areas. Nothing proved successful.

After exhausting all possibilities we solicited the City of Surrey for their help. They worked on the problem for approximately one month. In the end they could only locate one active water line in the area, and that connected the church to the 20th Ave. main water line. Their best guess was that our rental was on well water. In the end we felt the best solution would be to construct a dedicated water line between the church and our rental residence. Check-Point Plumbing completed the work under budget. Our tenants are very pleased with the results.

Our church was used as a Federal Polling Station for the October Federal election. We became a Block Watch contact.

We advertised, and interviewed a prospective candidate, for the Choir Director position. We continue to pray for God to send us the right person to replace Janet Rendell and the wonderful music she has blessed us with during the past 2 years.

We would like to close with a special acknowledgment and deep sense of appreciation for the tireless dedication to duty of our Office Administrator, Sheila Johnston.

ADOPT-A-STREET-TEAM REPORT

We completed our two year commitment in September 2015 and have moved onto our third year of keeping 120 Ave. clean from 129 St. East to 140 St. Six teams volunteer one day twice per year to walk the street picking up litter, construction materials and lots of cigarette butts. It generally takes a team one to three hours to walk end-to-end gathering sometimes over 20 pounds of trash. The bags are then left for the city to pick up or placed out with the church garbage. We had a few members step down this year causing us to combine two teams. The good news is the youth group came on board to fill in that space.

ALTAR GUILD REPORT

CHILDRENS' MINISTRY REPORT

2015 was a year of change for the Children's Ministry. We are using a lectionary-based program called "Roots". We opened the New Year by celebrating the Epiphany, the arrival of wise men from the East seeking the king of the Jews. We then moved into Mark's Gospel to hear of Jesus' baptism.

We read about the next revelation in John, when a disciple called Philip is recruited and goes off to tell his friend Nathaniel about Jesus. Having established that we are encountering the "king of the Jews", "my Son", "the son of God" we find out what this might mean. We learned that Jesus is a healer, ministering first to a demon-possessed man in a synagogue, then to Simon's mother-in-law. The time of Epiphany is drawn to a close with another revelation, as Jesus climbs a high mountain and the figures of Moses and Elijah appear, establishing his credentials as a prophet.

We then moved into Lent. Rev. Denise came downstairs to talk about baptism with us. Through song, skits and crafts, she taught us about Baptism and the Transfiguration. The following week was an Intergenerational Service. We joined together to celebrate the Baptism of a couple of our Sunday School children. The children, Sunday School teachers and helpers attended this Eucharist with a deeper understanding of the meaning and significance of the Transfiguration, especially as it relates to Baptism.

March 1 and 8 we were delighted to welcome Mari Anne Hussen to lead us in our singing accompanied with her guitar playing. Palm Sunday was a special service when the children carried palms around the church.

The children enjoyed being part of the Easter Sunday Service. They processed in with the clergy and choir with one of the children carrying the children's cross while all others carried carnations which they placed up at the altar. The following weeks we learned about how Jesus reveals himself as risen, yet still wounded and scarred. Thomas doubts what the others have seen and wants to experience Jesus' presence for himself. Jesus opens up to his disciples' minds to understand his words and how the scriptures have been fulfilled through his life, death and resurrection. Jesus bestows upon them the gift of being "witnesses" to his physical resurrection.

In May we made and distributed gifts to our church ladies in celebration of Mother's Day. May is our Missions Month so the children contributed food items which were then packed into lunch bags and sent off the Food Bank. We also had Youth come down and talk to the children about various Missions. We celebrated the Pentecost with an Intergenerational Service on May 24.

In June we made and distributed gifts to our church fathers in celebration of Father's Day. We also celebrated Eucharist in the outdoor chapel followed by the Sunday School picnic. We celebrated our last Sunday School Day until September on June 21.

There was no summer Sunday School Program for the children. For the few Sundays taught, they followed the Roots curriculum.

Vacation Bible School was held towards the end of August with a week-long program called SonSpark Labs. Was well attended and a great success.

We learned in September that Wendy Aiken had stepped down as Sunday School Coordinator and Margaret Appleton had stepped down as Sunday School teacher. We will miss them as they were such a gift to the children and other teachers.

Our Hot Dog Social was a successful start to the Fall term. In the lectionary September and October continued as Ordinary Time, and we read more passages from Mark's Gospel. Jesus continues his travels through the regions of Tyre, Caesarea Philippi, Galilee, Capernaum and on to Jericho. There is a clear sense of journey across the weeks. And as he speaks to, and is challenged by, the various groups he meets, we encounter some of Jesus' most challenging teaching.

September 20 was our first Preteen Ministry meeting which Linda Zeal and Kate Hoos held in the Youth Room upstairs. We are on a learning curve here so please pray for us that we can get this up and running and have a successful team of enthusiastic students going forward.

October 4 was bring your animals to church Sunday, and children were part of the service, and on October 18 we had an Intergenerational Service.

In November, Linda Zeal took over as Children's Ministry Coordinator. The last part of 2015 we learned about Advent and Christmas. We also practised for our Christmas Pageant. Janet Rendell came down every week from November 8 onward to help us practise the songs and also hold dress rehearsals. The children's performance was awesome.

It was another busy year with some challenges along the way. Our average attendance has been 20-25 and that swells on certain Sundays!

COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY REPORT

The direction of your Community Outreach Ministry is guided by the Mission Statement taken from St. Matthew, Chapter 25, verses 35 to 40 as follows:

I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me water
I was a stranger and you took me in;
Naked and you clothed me; ill and you comforted me;
In prison and you visited me.
And the King said, "what you do to the least of these my people, you do unto me".

During the past year, your Community Outreach Ministry supported various local organizations by supporting individuals in crisis, Single Mothers and their young children, Senior Women, Soup Lunches for Disabled Women, Young Mothers and their babies, and young men struggling with addiction.

History:

The late Pat Louis, a strong and vibrant parishioner of St. Mark's began this Ministry in early 1999. This Ministry was originally called "The Front Room" in recognition of what "The Front Room" -- a drop in shelter for homeless in the Whalley area – did for so many people.

At the end of that first year, the 'Front Room Ministry' had \$2000.00 in operating funds. It began with teams making sandwiches in the church kitchen and serving them at the Front Room in Whalley.

The Community Outreach Ministry has grown and is now supporting the various organizations and programs outlined in this report.

As of 2015, the Community Outreach Ministry supports projects both here in the South Surrey area and at the Front Room in Whalley. The operating budget for 2015 was \$12,935.00.

LEADERSHIP

The planning and administering of the programs are the responsibility of the Steering Committee which is comprised of members of the congregation: Barbara Grantham (Chair), Pat Aiken, Wendy Aiken, Betty-Ann Bainbridge, Roberta and John Braddock, Lynne Brownridge, Ann Colman, Lawrence Hurd, Alvin Myhre, Shannon Poulsen, and Darlene Wiegand.

INCOME & EXPENDITURE

Funding for this past year's activities came from the following sources: the Parishioners of St. Mark's, Ladies Evening Guild, the Sunday School and the Men's Club. The following financial statement documents funds received and the distribution of these funds to each project. It should be noted that the Community Outreach Ministry operates on a receipts-based reimbursement for expenditures basis.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS --- 2015

Throughout 2015, the Community Outreach Ministry met with the organizations supported through the Ministry. Programs are reviewed to ensure that what is being provided to each organization is what is best suited for their needs. Representatives from these organizations are invited to attend Ministry meetings to discuss their organizations and challenges they face on a regular basis. As outlined in this report, some changes were made during the past year in this support.

Lunch Basket for Hungry Children

The Lunch Basket for Hungry Children Program currently provides food for five Single Mothers whose children and youth would otherwise go to school hungry. This includes a grandmother who cares for her three grandchildren on a full time basis. This program supplies Safeway Gift Cards to Single Mothers to purchase food to provide their children with lunches. These families are identified to St. Mark's by Women's Place.

These five families are currently being supported on a weekly basis through contributions on the Donor Pledge Calendar posted in the Parish Hall. Thanksgiving or Memorial donations are recognized weekly in the Parish Pulse.

Thank you to Shannon Poulson, who delivers these Gift cards each month to Women's Place and to Darlene Wiegand who cares for the Donor Pledge Calendar.

The Protein Fund

Stan Hodgson, originated this program to purchase high protein food to those who participate in the 'Lunch Basket' program. Beef, chicken and pork and other high protein foods are purchased with donations received from within the parish. These 'Protein' packets are made up and delivered to Women's Place. Any new 'Lunch Basket' families are added into the High Protein support.

Stan's vision continues and is funded by members of St. Mark's congregation. Thank you to Roberta Braddock for her dedicated time and organization of this program.

The Blanche Biddle Trust Fund.

The Blanche Biddle Trust Fund assists Single Mothers with young children anywhere in our area that need a temporary financial 'hand up'. With the consent of the original donors, the focus of the Blanche Biddle Fund, has now shifted to identifying needy individual families with school age children who attend school anywhere in the district.

This program was pioneered by the Outreach Committee seven years ago with the original donor, Blanche Biddle. The breakfast program started in one school. As the program was so successful, the Surrey School District has now taken it over by obtaining special funding for qualified school communities.

With the help of child care workers at the school, families had been identified this past year and were offered financial support for groceries while the mothers were re-establishing themselves. After successfully moving forward with either work or school, young mothers move forward and again become the breadwinners of their families.

Thank you to Alvin Myhre who has coordinated and overseen this program.

Stepping Stones

Stepping Stones welcomes all pregnant and parenting youth between the ages of 12 and 24. Most of these young parents come from unsupportive homes and have nowhere to turn for support and are faced with overwhelming odds and challenges. Young Mothers attend programs to improve their circumstances.

Monthly funding was provided to Stepping Stones for young mothers to purchase diapers, and for bus tickets for these young parents to attend workshops and support groups at this non-profit organization.

AMA Transition House

AMA Transition House is the first transition house of its kind in Canada. Accessible to women 55+ who are experiencing abuse – AMA House serves a community where the number of seniors per capita is twice the national average although there are no geographical limitations for access. 'First Stage' residential care home provides immediate assistance to Senior Women in need.

Monthly funding provides bus tickets and personal items for women who are residents of AMA House.

Thank you to Wendy Aiken for coordinating, shopping and delivering these items.

Vegetable Deliveries

The supply of vegetables to Women's Place, The Launching Pad and the South Surrey Food Bank was changed this year.

After meeting with each of the recipients of the vegetable delivery, they agreed unanimously that they would be best served by receiving a quarterly payment of \$100, a better choice for their needs. These donations are designated for vegetables only.

'Souper' Sunday 2015

AMA House

This initiative from the Community Outreach Ministry continues to be a wonderful success. During the cooler months of the year members of the Community Outreach Ministry prepare the soup of the month and it is sold on the Sunday morning. We are blessed to have skilled shoppers, choppers and sellers!

The Committee members meet on the Saturday prior to the soup sale to create a homemade soup for sale after both the 8am and 10am services the next day.

The 'Souper Sunday' project has been able to assist in purchasing and delivering items on 'wish lists' to the following organizations:

- Safeway Gift Cards to the value of \$15.00/child per week are distributed monthly to young mothers to purchase food for their children/youth who would otherwise go to school hungry. A grandmother who is caring for her three grandchildren on a full time basis is also a recipient of these gift cards.
- > Extra Gift cards for special holidays such as Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas are provided to the families who participate in the Lunch Basket Program for Hungry Children. These families can enjoy some extras at these holiday times as do others in the community.
- Christmas Gift Hamper Gift Cards were again provided by the Sunday School children, ACW, Evening Guild, Bible Study groups and the committee of the Community Outreach Ministry. The Gift Cards were delivered to the mothers and children who participate in our Lunch Basket for Hungry Children program.
- Christmas Dinner Gift Cards for Safeway were provided to these families in the Lunch Basket for Hungry Children Program this year. This change was due to special food and diet considerations for the families.
- The Protein Project a continuing project initiated by Stan Hodgson is funded with a monthly donation to purchase meat for children and youth who do not have sufficient protein in their diet.
- \$100.00 is sent quarterly to the Food Bank and Women's Place and designated for vegetables.

CREATION CARE MINISTRY

Although this ministry wasn't officially re-launched until January 24, 2016; urgent work began in May 2015 in two main areas:

1. to greatly limit the amount of refuse the parish puts into the landfill.

The kitchen coordinators, care-taking staff, Wardens, Mens' Club and maintenance crew were consulted to create and label new disposal bins in the old wooden cupboard outside the kitchen door. These new bins allow us to recycle the church's plastic bags, household plastics, styrofoam, small appliances, glass, mixed metal and other items that the City of Surrey will recycle at one of the local depots. In addition to this; we've paid greater attention to ensure that all garden refuse, organics (napkins, paper towels, soiled pizza boxes etc.) from all functions held at St. Mark's, are collected weekly in the City's Organic Bin. These strategies have been very effective in limiting our damage to the earth and water through the landfill.

2. to develop new standards of maintenance for the 'St. Mark's Forest'

For many years parishioners have enjoyed the wonderful green space that includes the Outdoor Chapel and the Journey of Christmas in the back forest. Urgent intervention was required in two areas this past 'drought-like' summer.

- A. to reduce the very high fire load and threat due to stockpiles of dry branches, needles etc. as well as to remove dead branches and to fell a dead tree
- B. to pneumatically remove debris that buried mature tree trunks and would have killed them

Fund Raising

Ingenuity was the key to achieving these goals without cutting into revenue from existing programmes. In November, parishioners collected more than 470 lbs. of **Bits 'n Pieces** (Bits of Brass & pieces of Pipe etc. and recycling of metal) raising \$375.00 towards the cost of work done in the forest. Watch for another such event in the Spring.

DONATIONS SECRETARY REPORT

The decision to reissue the same envelope numbers to weekly and monthly donors has worked well and currently we order 140 weekly envelope sets and 80 monthly envelope sets. As in prior years for various reasons on average about 20 weekly and 12 monthly envelope numbers become available for re-allocation in the New Year.

In 2014 45 newcomers donated through pew envelopes and thirteen decided to become either weekly or monthly envelope donors and another fifteen have continued to donate using pew envelopes. In 2015 there were 80+ newcomers of which five decided to become either PAD or weekly envelope donors and eleven others continued to donate using pew envelopes.

As mentioned in the 2014 report when you look at the comparative figures there is just one item that requires explanation, note that in years 2011, 2012 and 2013 there were "Capital Renewal (WRF)" campaigns; in 2013 the campaign had been completed and so donations to Capital \$5,295 and (WRF) \$2,550 should not be compared with the prior years.

On behalf of Irene Snow, we thank all members of the "Counters Teams" for their dedication to duty. All donations are received in the strictest confidence and are receipted for income tax purposes at year-end. The following summarizes the financial donations by the parishioners of St. Mark, Ocean Park in 2015 with comparative figures for 2014, 2013, 2012 and 2011. The Operating Fund Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 2015, reflects our steadfastness.

 ♦ Net Deficit - \$(13,046.04)

I appreciate and thank every ministry and their leaders for their good financial stewardship. In addition to operating contributions and revenue of \$418,734.48 we also received \$4,425.89 in Capital Funds, \$29,462.92 in contributions to Community Outreach, PWRDF and other ministries. Bequests received during the year were \$10,000.00 from Margaret Keen Estate, \$25,000.00 from William Copeland Estate, \$1,000.00 in celebration of Bill and Joyce Ness' anniversary.

This is not including funds raised by ACW, Evening Guild and Men's Club – as always, well done good and faithful servants! The Parish of St. Mark - Ocean Park is richly blessed by your love and faithfulness of the countless hours of "Time and Talent" to which many, many volunteer so willingly and faithfully contribute. For this, we give God all the praise and glory!

Total GIC Investments at year end is \$486,044.86. It was necessary to redeem GICs in the amount of \$29,060.50 to provide the cash flow for the capital expenses and operating deficit during the year. Another GIC will be purchased for \$10,000.00 until cash flow is needed.

Thank you to those that have their contributions processed by P.A.D. (pre-authorized donations). This is especially helpful with cash flow management in the summer months. Please consider signing up if you have not already done so.

Nancy Rickett of McDonald Rickett, Chartered Accountants has performed a "Review Engagement" for the year ended December 31, 2015 as required by the Charities Act. Her Review Engagement Report is included in the Annual Report with the Financial Reports.

A very heartfelt thank you to Sheila Johnston for her help and support with data entry, to the Donation Secretary, Douglas Brown, and the Clergy, Wardens and Trustees for your input and encouragement.

A special thank you to the Prayer Shield Team who covers us in prayer as we meet and seek God's will for the Parish. The Lord's guidance and presence is very much felt in these meetings.

The budget for 2016 reflects a realistic assessment of the expected operating costs of the Parish for the ensuing year. The decrease in the budget is due to the resignation of our Assistant Priest. It is our goal to reflect budget and ministry costs as accurately and transparent as possible while providing for the well being of the growth and development of the parish.

Notes to the Financial Statement and Budget

Cash:

Our ending cash balance is \$52,037.82. The larger than usual balance is due to a \$25,000.00 bequest received at year end.

Investments:

In 2015 it was necessary to redeemed \$29,060.50 of our investments to maintain sufficient cash flow for Parish operations and Capital Expenses. The yearend balance is \$486,044.86 Investments represent "Trust Funds" for Ministry Programs, Youth and Children's Ministries, Bequests and Capital Funds and Operating Surplus. It is important to note the 2015 deficit has reduced our surplus operating funds to \$3,896.27.

Receivables:

P.A.D. (Pre Authorized Deposit) Receivable of \$10,452.00 is applied to our monthly remittance to the Diocese for payroll and the Diocesan Assessment, reducing our monthly payment.

GST Receivable of \$1,221.03 is the expected refund for the second half of 2015. Accrued Interest – interest earned to December 31, 2015 on the GICs.

Fixed Assets:

Changes in Church Buildings and Improvements are the additions of Capital Expenses less depreciation for the year. As a note of interest, on the 2016 Property Assessment Notice, the Assessed Value is \$5,807,600.

Liabilities:

Accrued Accounts Payables are the Year End Accounting fees of \$3,075.00, Damage Deposits of \$100.00 for Hall Rental, and \$2,000.00 for the Rectory.

Fund Balances:

By reviewing the Report of Fund Balances, one can clearly see the Balances brought forward from prior year (Opening Balance), Total Income and Total Expenses for the year giving the Closing Balance of each Fund and Ministry at year end.

Income:

Contributions for 2015 decreased by \$21,732.85, while the Revenue increased by \$10,365.38 with a net income reduction of \$11,367.47. The total income for the year was under budget by \$19,571.52.

Expenses:

While Operating and Ministry expenses were under budget by \$6,525.48, Total expenses exceeded our income for the year leaving a Deficit of \$13,046.04.

Budget 2016

The proposed 2016 budget for Envelope Contributions has been reduced as a result of the resignation of our Assistant Priest with provisions for only quarter time assistance and clergy relief. Expenses have been analyzed to reflect the realistic cost of operations and forecast of expected revenue. The difference is the amount of Contributions required by parishioners for the operation of the parish.

This Budget was approved by Finance Committee and Parish Council for presentation for approval at Vestry.

Building & Maintenance Capital Expenditures

At last year's Vestry meeting I noted a number of initiatives that would be undertaken during the year (see Annual Report 2015). These were are follows:

- Compile a monthly maintenance schedule for the year to ensure an annual inspection of all major building and maintenance systems; such as, furnaces and the rental septic system. This has been done.
- 2. A review of our systems, practices, and procedures, with the objective of conserving energy and reducing expenses. Ken Miles and Don Hamilton have undertaken this with respect to our heating and lighting systems (please refer to Warden's Report).
- 3. Develop a long range building & maintenance capital expenditure report. This is under way and is expected to be completed by our next Vestry, Feb. 2017.

Between now and the 2017 Vestry we do however anticipate the need to expend funds on certain capital projects, therefore the requirement to come before Vestry at this time to request authorization for that expenditure.

There was universal acceptance on the merit of developing a long range building plan to give us a time table of when we can reasonably expect replacement costs of our various building and maintenance components.

There was however considerable debate at both Clergy and Wardens, and Parish Council, over the approach that should be taken. One idea was to hire an outside consulting firm to produce something similar to a depreciation report common to strata plans.

In the end we solicited guidance from Rob Dickson, Business Administrator for our Diocese. It was his opinion that professional reports were prohibitively expensive. It would be much more prudent and in keeping with general church practice, if we utilized the expertise within our own parish. This was ultimately the course of action recommended by the Clergy & Wardens, and adopted by Parish Council.

Our Maintenance Coordinators, Ken and Don, volunteered to prepare a long range capital expenditure plan for our church and rectory. They will have available for consultation many extremely talented and knowledgeable fellow parishioners, including: John Reader, Cliff Neyedli, and Jack Blachford. This plan was approved by Parish Council.

Ken and Don have started on the plan. They have identified four major areas that will likely need attention within the next year.

1. New roof for the hall - Estimated replacement cost \$35,000 - \$55,000

Our original church sanctuary, which is now our church hall, was built approximately 50 years ago. It has a tar and gravel roof which has a number of easily observable rips in it, although it is not leaking at present. It is highly recommended that the roof be replaced at a time most convenient to the church. We have received two replacement cost bids, noted above, and will require a third.

- 2. New 40 ft. container to replace 3 outdoor sheds rotting at the base \$13,000
- 3. Repair/replace flashings and gutters on sanctuary roof source of leaks \$5,000
- 4. Repair East retaining wall coming apart in places \$15,000

It is anticipated that total expenditures, not including taxes, will be approximately \$88,000.

Please come to the Vestry Meeting prepared to discuss the authorization of the anticipated expenses.

FIRST FRUITS GARDEN PROJECT

Honour the Lord with your wealth, and with the first fruits of all your crops.....

In 1992 the First Fruits Garden Project began as an innovative way of sharing the fruits of God's bounty while raising funds for refugees of war-torn Bosnia/Herzegovina. Through many of the intervening years St. Mark's avid and amateur gardeners have graciously and generously shared the fruits of their labour. We've all enjoyed wonderfully fresh fruit, vegetables and herbs and shared the magnificent glory of a wide variety of flowers with both awe and delight.

Many in the parish have enjoyed mixing and mingling over the First Fruits Garden tables in the hall following each Sunday Service from June through October. We've shared amazing gardening wisdom, new foods, recipes etc. while coming to know and to appreciate each other in different ways. From the first of Bill Ness's amazing sweet peas, Isabel Powell' s wondrous variety and bounty of flowers, Nick Timm's stunning dahlias ...to each tomato, spear of kale, purple bean, seedling & herb...all have been offered with love so that God's love can be shared.

Our gifts have offered food, medicine, shelter and medical aid to our brothers and sisters at home and across God's world. In the '90s we stretched out our hands to hurting people in Bosnia/Herzegovina and Rwanda as well as Haiti and parts of Africa. In the past few years funds raised from this project have also been used to refurbish St. Mark's Memorial Garden, augment Ministry funds in the parish and to support two of our youth as they assisted communities in Africa. God has blessed us and given us the privilege of sending His love and aid to our brothers and sisters in the drought stricken region of Sahel, Africa; the people of Japan following the earthquake and tidal wave; our brothers and sisters in Nepal following the earthquake; and most recently in assisting the victims and refugees fleeing Syria.

Most of the monies have been offered through the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund, Doctors Without Borders and the United Nations High Commission on Refugees. Where possible, we received matching grants to augment this work.

My heartfelt thanks to all who have so graciously and generously shared their "first fruits" and to all who have donated to enjoy them. Thank you also to Michael & Les for setting up the tables, and to Mary Brown, Joyce McQuarrie and to each one who helped with the table.

May God continue to bless us as we reach out in His love.

PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND (PWRDF) REPORT

Founded in 1958, the current Primate's World Relief and Development Fund aims to connect Canadian Anglicans to communities around the world – to advance development, respond to emergencies, assist refugees, and to act for positive change.

St. Mark's again rose to the call to support communities on the other side of our world – this time, in 2015, the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund's assistance to Nepal, faced with its two horrific earthquake disasters; and the worsening conditions in the Middle East.

We at St. Mark's donated over \$2,000 from our "Guess Who Is Coming To Dinner?" fundraiser held in private homes (with unannounced guests and hosts!) on May 16. The total contribution from individuals' envelopes to PWRDF in 2015 came to \$6,215.00.

Appreciation is extended to groups within St. Mark's for further contributions to PWRDF –St. Mark's Men's Club \$750.00; Evening Guild \$825.42; Anglican Church Women (ACW) \$100.00.

All our contributions were matched by the federal government, thus doubling the above amounts from St. Mark's. PWRDF programs are focused on food security, health care, humanitarian relief, refugee support, poverty reduction, human rights and peace work. It also has active interests in Canada's indigenous peoples and communities.

The Parish Hall sound system was last updated in 2013 and at the moment it has repurposed used equipment whenever a need has arisen.

The sound system was tuned up in November and many microphones have been repositioned to take advantage of our ever changing congregational needs. Chuck Vanderbill of Pro-Sound spent December balancing our Sanctuary sound board so that all the Sanctuary speakers are now performing as they were designed and balanced as they should be.

Please free to speak to any member of the Sound Technicians Team, or myself, if you have concerns or questions about the sound quality or limited coverage areas in the Church.

Questions from the congregation have already made an improvement in 2016, that will see another microphone installed in the pulpit for better volume/sound and three additional microphones will be permanently installed for the Praise Team to the left side of the pulpit.

With the departure of our "wonderful" choir and children's choir director ('bye Janet) we shall again be challenged to provide excellent coverage.

Hearing "loops" are available to parishioners with hearing aids that can be programmed to work in "Telephone Mode" by your hearing aid dispenser. The cost to the parishioner is \$80 and you can talk to Brian "the pie guy" if you would like to have one. We may be able to equip you for a trial run during a 10am Service. Several parishioners have tested and approved our new hearing assist system already and are enjoying the ability to listen without having to install an ear bud in their ears.

The sound ministry has an ongoing commitment to provide quality sound performance to all parishioners. A constant flow of volunteers is required to maintain St. Mark's sound system. Please see a sound team technician if you should be so inclined to want to join us.

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT

"Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting! Amen and Amen." Psalm 41:13

C.S. Lewis very wisely stated that "the Present is the point at which time touches eternity." This is a thought that really resonated with me this year as I think back on another year of ministry. Each moment is like a flash of light—here and then gone—while life is just a sequence of these quickly passing moments. Each moment in our year, and each minute within our day, is an opportunity for us to acknowledge the Holy and awesome presence of the Lord who is with us in the here and now. And that's what youth ministry at St. Mark's is all about—helping our youth come to realize and take hold of the great treasure that is the Christian faith and know that eternity is at their fingertips.

Our ReThink Sunday classes on Sunday mornings are always a beautiful time for our group to connect with one another and dive deeper into our faith. We began the year working through the Burning Questions DVD series which helped us ask questions—and find answers—to some of the big questions of faith. We also transitioned to a more lectionary-based approach which allowed us to explore the Scripture together. Some of our youth continued to be involved in the readers' ministry, and Rev. Denise also mentored the youth into various serving roles on a Sunday morning, including serving at the altar and with the children's ministry.

Our *Thrive Tuesdays* are our less formal weekly gatherings. If you were to find yourself with us on a Tuesday night, you would likely find yourself having played some games—like our weekly Powerpoint quiz (with great prizes!) or Cranium—watched some funny videos, sang along in worship, spent time in prayer, and shared your thoughts on topics of faith. We learned about several New Testament characters in the *Re:Form Ancestors* series, such as St. Paul, and began to consider the relationship between science and faith using the TrueU series of talks by Focus on the Family. Who knew that DNA and cosmology could be so interesting when considered in light of God's existence?

One of this year's highlights was our youth retreat which kicked off our Fall ministry in September. Our theme was "Seek & Find: Communing with God, Self and Others." Rev. Denise, Rebeca and myself took a group of youth to Kawkawa Camp near Hope for a weekend filled with times of teaching by Rev. Denise on prayer and contemplation, an evening around a campfire singing worship songs and watching The Simpsons (with a spiritual message, of course!), fun times swimming at the waterfront, kayaking, playing dodgeball, and testing our skills at riflery. It was a great success with many laughs, and most importantly a chance for each of us to find new ways of relating with God, ourselves, and each other.

Outside our regular programming, our *Breakout Events* throughout the year provide opportunities for youth to bring their friends and have some fun. A group of us went to Richmond to try to crack the riddles at an Escape Room in the Spring, and this Christmas we had our 3rd annual bowling and gift exchange party, again kindly hosted by the Featherstone's. Bowling, Christmas carols, gifts, pizza and games—what could be a better way to celebrate our Saviour's birth with friends?

There were opportunities again for our youth to serve in parish life, such as the Parish Picnic, VBS, the Holly Berry Fair, and by helping keep the streets clean and tidy through the Adopt-a-Street program.

Once again, thank you for partnering with us in ministry in prayer and support in other ways. Let us always seek to love and serve the Lord with all our heart in each moment in the year to come.
