ANNUAL VESTRY MEETING OF THE PARISH OF ST. MARK OCEAN PARK Sunday February 21, 2016

PRESIDING CHAIRPERSON: Brian Switzer

PEOPLE IN ATTENDANCE: 128

OPENING PRAYER: Rev. John Mash

WELCOME

Brian Switzer called the meeting to order at 11:40am.

Brian welcomed everyone to the meeting. In his introductory remarks, he reflected on the upcoming baseball season and the words of the Toronto Blue Jays pitcher, Paul Molitor, prior to the 1993 World Series. "To move the line along" was Molitor's objective for his team, to move the base runners along, so that runs could be scored and games could be won, with every team mate doing his part.

Brian applied the same analogy to the work we do as team mates at St. Mark's, moving the line along for God's work.

Paul reminded us in Corinthians that we are the body of the church through Christ. We are all involved in doing God's work. We work as teams. I worked on a team as a warden with the clergy and the Parish Council. Teams work within teams to move God's work along. Nobody is going to hit a home run and solve all the problems. I have talked with Ken Turnham, who was a warden decades ago and some of the issues he dealt with are the same things we are dealing with today. Other issues we won't know about until tomorrow. All we can do is to deal with the issues before us, and to move God's work along as best we can – with Jesus as a part of us and of what we are trying to accomplish here.

2. APPROVAL OF VESTRY MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 15 2015

MOVED BY BARBARA WALKS, SECONDED BY LYNNE HURD that the Minutes of the Annual Vestry Meeting of February 15 2015 BE ACCEPTED as written in the Vestry Annual Report. CARRIED.

3. BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES: LONG TERM FINANCIAL PROJECTS

Brian Switzer referred to the Building & Maintenance Report (see page 34 of the 2015 Annual Report).

A long range building and maintenance capital expenditure report is being prepared by Ken Miles and Don Hamilton, and it is expected to be completed by our next Vestry Meeting in February 2017.

Two items need attention before the next Vestry Meeting. First, it is recommended that the roof of our Hall be replaced, and second, that the three outdoor sheds also be replaced.

Ken Miles answered questions, and there was discussion about both items.

MOVED BY BARBARA CARINGTON SMITH, SECONDED BY KEN ANDERSON that the Hall roof be repaired and replaced for the amount up to \$55,000.00 plus taxes as per estimates received, with funds to be taken from the Capital Funds. CARRIED.

On a point of order, that motions, would be subsequently voted on by a show of hands, not voices.

MOVED BY BARBARA CARINGTON SMITH, SECONDED BY KEN ANDERSON that a new 40' container to replace 3 outdoor sheds used for storage be purchased for the amount of up to \$15,000.00 plus taxes, with funds to be taken from the Bequest Funds. CARRIED.

6. THE STRATGEIC PLANNING TEAM - PETER BOORMAN

Peter introduced the members of his team: Brian Walks, Sue Indridson, Michael Klaver, Heather Davies, Mari Anne Hussen, Cory Paige, Michael Musherure and Brian Maxwell. Rev. Craig Tanksley is an intermediary between the team and the Parish Council. Peter thanked Rev. Denise Doerksen for her work.

We are doing strategic planning now because a strong organization continues to plan. Canada's demographics are changing, as ours is a multicultural country. Many people in our congregation have been at the church for a long time. Our team has looked at attendance and offerings numbers and they are quite stable over the last three years.

Reginald Bibby, a famous church psychologist, has said that Christian churches are in Renaissance now. However, he also reports that although 80% of Canadians believe in God, only 22% attend church. That is why we have this strategic planning team, and why we have work to do. We are trying to keep things simple, and we are putting forward three questions for you to consider today.

- 1. What do you love about St. Mark's, what are its strengths?
- 2. Why do you think newcomers decide not to stay at St. Mark's?
- 3. What would you like to see changed, to help our church flourish?

Our strong Parish Council keeps the church stable, and our strategic planning team will look to the future and plan over the next two years. This is our first chance to reach out to you, and it will not be the last. Please fill out your pink question sheets and place them in the box.

7. TREASURER'S REPORT

Barbara Carington Smith gave a Powerpoint presentation of the financial reports on pages 26-33 of the 2015 Annual Report. Notes and Comments:

- a. Capital expenditures in 2016 will be used from the Capital Funds given and bequested to us in 2014, as the Capital Renewal Funds have been fully disbursed.
- b. There were Bequests of \$36,000 in 2015.
- c. It is important for us to note that the Parish Operating Fund Surplus was reduced to \$3,896.27 at the end of December 2015. Further, we need to note that at the end of January 2016 there is a Deficit of \$5,827.29. Thus, the church is in an Operating Deficit position and is now relying on other funds for its operations.
- d. Barbara reviewed the Statement of Parish Operations speaking to the Deficit of \$13,046.04 at the year end. She encouraged the parish to review the 2015 Actual and 2015 Budget line items on the Comparative Budget Statement, noting the Total Expenses were \$6,230 under Budget in 2015. Barbara asked rhetorically, "How can we change this?" She answered that our cost control, leadership and faithful servants, and Budget are all sound.
- e. She explained the implications of the Operating Deficit, concluding that if our Operating Deficit exceeds \$3,896.27 at the end of 2016, **Bequest Funds** will have to be moved into Operating Funds at year end. She prays that this would not be necessary.

Barbara observed that God works among us. She answered several questions. The Donations Secretary provided general information about weekly/monthly envelope donations. There was discussion about strategies for increasing Contributions. It was suggested that quarterly notice of members' Contribution levels by the church might help to increase Contributions (by up to 20%, according to givings research).

MOVED BY BARBARA CARINGTON SMITH, SECONDED BY BRIAN MAXWELL that the Treasurer's Report and the December 31, 2015 Financial Statements be accepted as presented. CARRIED.

8. 2016 BUDGET

Barbara presented the 2016 Budget, noting changes that will be helpful to our disposition in 2016. She discussed meeting our various commitments and responsibilities (the Diocesan assessment, insurance, operations and administration expenses, etc.) during the year to do God's work. The Budget was prepared in consideration of only one full-time clergy effective February 1st, resulting in a reduction of Clergy Expenses by \$44,000 and a few other minor adjustments. The 2016 Budget has been reduced by \$44,956.

Barbara enquired of the Congregation as to their communication preferences regarding any Operating Deficit concerns in 2016. The response was that both Parish Pulse and Sanctuary announcements would be appropriate.

The Lord says to us, "For I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

MOVED BY BARBARA CARINGTON SMITH, SECONDED BY CLIFF NEYEDLI that the Budget for 2016 be accepted as presented. CARRIED.

9. ACCEPTANCE OF ANNUAL REPORT 2015

Brian Switzer noted several corrections. First, on page 11 of the 2015 Annual Report, third paragraph, line 1: Holly Conversations is corrected to read Holy Conversations.

Second, on page 11, tenth paragraph, lines 3-4.: Both individuals are being recognized for their many outstanding years of service to our parish is corrected to read Olive Pociwauschek is being recognized for her many outstanding years of service to our parish. Dorothy Mash is being recognized for her many outstanding years of service at the Diocesan level.

Third, on page 13, first paragraph, line 2: 120 Ave. is corrected to read 20 Ave.

MOVED BY SUE INDRIDSON, SECONDED BY CATHY TESKEY that the 2015 Annual Ministry Reports be accepted as corrected. CARRIED.

10. NEW BUSINESS - ST. MARK SYRIAN REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP COMMITTEE - MICHAEL KLAVER

Michael gave a brief history of how members of the parish had become concerned about sponsoring a Syrian refugee family in the autumn of 2015. The Refugee Committee was created, and the Committee received both the parish's encouragement and its formal approval.

After research and review, the Refugee Committee decided to proceed with a blended sponsorship arrangement, involving the parish and the Canadian government jointly sponsoring a Syrian refugee family. It is about a \$36,000 project for the parish, and Michael thanked the congregation members who have already provided pledges or cash donations. He added that financially supporting the family needed to be above and beyond members' ongoing commitments to St. Mark's. Michael described the work of the different Subcommittees preparing for the refugee family's arrival.

Michael explained that there was a new group of refugee families arriving within a month, and he expressed the hope that our family would be in this group. He promised to update the parish as the situation unfolded. Michael opened the floor for questions, and there was a general discussion about the local churches that have already welcomed Syrian refugee families. Michael observed that there was tremendous amount of excitement in the parish about this project. He added that the Syrian family could potentially arrive next month, and he described how people could financially support the project immediately via their numbered donation envelopes.

11. RECTOR'S REPORT

My heart is full today as we come to the end of this meeting.

I am full of gratefulness to God for the way the Lord continually meets our needs

We came to the end of last year with a sense of sorrow at the loss of two staff members who were precious to us. And also many leaders who had fulfilled their time of service and were stepping back from those roles, Brian Switzer not the least. Hasn't he done a great job! We wondered how we would move forward and what could possibly fill that void. And the Lord has provided.

God has given us wonderful new leaders to serve us in the coming year on Parish Council and in several other important areas of ministry here.

We also welcome Beverly Neville to St. Mark's as our new Choir Director. God has blessed us in her with someone full of talent and creative energy. If you want to be musically involved, please talk to Beverly.

When I announced that John Mash would be coming on board as our part-time Pastoral Assistant, there was a collective sigh of relief. We know and love him and Dorothy and they have proven themselves to be talented and faithful workers among us.

Above and beyond all that, the Lord is providing us with something entirely new. We are about to enter into a covenant with a retired Deacon by the name of Stephen Bailey. Most of you have already met Pamela and Stephen. What a gift they are already offering as Stephen is teaching our Lenten Course this year on Anglican Formation. He will also be helping us train and prepare the newly elected Parish Council for the work ahead. The covenant is a brand new thing in our Diocese, and Stephen will be amongst us for about a year teaching us about the ministry of a deacon. What a blessing this is!

I want to mention a further great blessing. God has provided a service of contemplation prayer and teaching on Sunday evenings through the gifted ministry of Revs. Scott and Miriam Tolhurst. What a wonderful surprise, and this ministry is speaking to the deep places of longing in the hearts and spirits of a number of our fellow seekers.

I am so grateful for the provision of God.

I am deeply thankful for the faithfulness and generosity of many servants in the church. I read carefully every report and I felt like my heart would burst. What a wonderful story this report is. A story of people who love God. Who care about the work of God. Who pour their lives, their time, their treasure and their prayers into this place. And who have given so generously to the needs in the community around us.

I am proud of you. I am proud to be a member of this faith community. I am deeply thankful to each and everyone for all the things that you do, both seen and unseen, that make St. Mark's such a very special place. Praise the Lord.

RECTOR'S REPORT

Dear St. Mark's Family,

We have entered a new year, 2017, and at this Vestry we take time to look back over the year that has gone and the blessings of God in it. They are many!

We have enjoyed some amazing teaching and seminar opportunities this year thanks to the wonderfully talented people God has given us. Deacon Steve Bailey played an important teaching role by effectively leading our Parish Council Retreat in March. He followed up with a truly outstanding course on Anglicanism 101. We thank God for our Deacon and his talented work among us. Remember that he and his wife Pamela faithfully commute from Coquitlam to serve us!

Rev. Scott and Miriam Tolhurst have been a wonderful blessing in our parish for leadership in contemplative prayer. The every other Sunday evening for meditation and silent prayer is serving a deep hunger in our parish. We are moving to integrate more contemporary worship music and yet not lose the gift of our traditional worship and liturgy as an Anglican church. Annabelle is a pillar. Our Contemporary Worship Band along with the Youth Band have played a role in our worship this year. Emily has plugged into everything and also brought the Children's Choir back to life again. All this is good news.

God has blessed us with a terrific clergy team. I am personally so grateful for the ministry of Rev. John Mash and Rev. Stephen Bailey. We work well together. One of our members has often commented that, "You will always hear a good sermon at St. Marks!"

Sheila continues to provide an anchor in the church office handling a multitude of daily tasks to coordinate our life together.

At the core of our parish is strong lay leadership. Our annual reports demonstrate an amazing amount of volunteer ministry as people generously share their talents with us in the work of God. I am deeply grateful for all of our leaders and our staff who coordinate our activities, lead programs, care for seniors, and run our youth and children activities. And so I enter this year with a thankful heart. I hold on to a tremendous hope and expectation that the Lord will lead us. That the Lord will walk with us. That the Lord will give us new vision and along with it every resource necessary to carry out God's will and purpose for St. Mark, Ocean Park.

DEACON'S REPORT

"The lines have fallen to me in pleasant places; indeed my heritage is beautiful to me".

-Psalm 16:6

It is a privilege to be a diaconal presence among the people of St. Mark Ocean Park. Pamela and I have been warmly welcomed and feel supported by this wonderful community of people who love Jesus and seek to follow him.

Working within the parameters of "teaching deacon", I have been able to share in the worship, pastoral care, and teaching ministries of the parish. A clear goal we have is that God would call one or more persons at St. Mark's to enter into ordained diaconal ministry. I say "ordained" because diaconal ministry among the laity at St. Mark's is already strong, but God may be speaking to someone to enter into the type of ministry that has a special servant relationship with the parish and with the mission of God in which we individually and collectively participate.

Sharing worship leadership with Craig and John and our faithful choir, musicians, readers, intercessors sidespersons, servers and crucifers is indeed an honour. Carrying out the traditional diaconal roles of setting and clearing the Communion table, reading the Gospel and being part of the preaching ministry is indeed a privilege.

A highlight for me was our 2016 Lenten Series, "Anglicanism 101". As we gathered together to explore our Anglican heritage and ethos, we developed a community of inquirers - celebrating together the diversity and Christian expressions that constitute Anglican Christian life and practice. I'm looking forward to Lent 2017 where Craig and I will share teaching around the "Anglican Marks of Mission". These sessions will be coordinated with a preaching series which Craig, John and I will do.

I was also able to lead a retreat day last Spring with the Parish Council where we explored some procedural methods and self-reflection techniques for church governance.

I've also been able to speak about the life and work of a deacon and about my own diaconal ministry with several parish groups including the Men's Club, The Ladies Guild, the Youth Group, and the Wardens and Parish Council. We now have several copies of the diocesan Deacons Handbook in the parish. If you would like to see a copy, just ask and I'll get you one.

Since diaconal ministry is centred in "bringing the needs and concerns of the world to the church, and the Good News of the Gospel to a needy world", I continue to serve our Lord in the community. I continue as Padre of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 263 (Coquitlam) and am part of the Ecumenical and Multi-Faith Unit of the diocese. I'm also a part of the Advisory Committee for the Downtown East Side Ministry led by Rev. Matthew Johnson. I am also chaplain at the Emergency Food Cupboard at St. Barnabas in New Westminster where I am able to talk with and pray with a variety of marginalized and even homeless people as well as new immigrants. My work with the Board of Directors of the BC Retired Teachers Association has opened the door to be part of the First Call Child and Youth Advocacy Coalition and part of the Advisory Committee of its subsidiary, the Living Wage Campaign of British Columbia.

Thank you, St. Mark Ocean Park, for giving me the opportunity to be a "deacon in residence". May we continue to be a mutual blessing to one another during my time here.

I submitted notices for the Pulse which encourages children not to run inside during coffee hour and reminds parents to ensure adult supervision while the children are outside. In addition, I suggested everyone at the church be encouraging to young families and treat this place as "a village" in order to help young parents fellowship during coffee hour as well. I purchased the little green plastic "man" and have it placed in the hall to remind children to slow down.

I have, at various times, bought cards and flowers to honour the great work our volunteers do and occasionally bring concerns from various groups and individuals back to Clergy and Wardens meetings.

Finally, in the Fall, I started what I am calling Messy Bible Study. This brings together younger adults for Bible Study and fellowship once a month on a Friday night. Those with young children and without child care can bring them along. While the adults study and socialize, the children play and watch a family-friendly movie. This has been a lot of fun and I look forward to having more of these in the coming year.

PEOPLE'S WARDENS REPORT - Roger Hussen

I'd like to begin my People's Warden report with a few phrases borrowed (and edited for brevity) from the "Diocesan Warden's Handbook".

"Church wardens were originally guardians, as they protected the people from the priest, and the priest from the people. Today however, wardens don't need to be bodyguards because the clergy and the congregation share equally in the running of the parish."

Thank goodness I didn't have to be a bodyguard during my time as a warden.

Seriously though, all the above being said, our wardens, our clergy, our parish council, and our congregation couldn't do anything to "run" our church without God's help. We all need to continue to pray for wisdom to follow God's plan for our parish. In Proverbs ch 3 vs 5-6 it says, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight." And in Jeremiah ch 29 vs 11 it says, "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

From the "Diocesan Warden's Handbook" again, "Church Wardens are responsible for the buildings, records and funds of the parish."

Those few words make the job of a warden sound simple enough. But, the three areas of responsibility listed are huge tasks to carry out, and impossible for two or three wardens to fulfill by themselves. At St. Mark Ocean Park we are fortunate to have many people in many different ministries working together to follow God's plan for us. As it says in Romans ch 8 vs 8, "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose."

Over the past 50 years that St. Mark Ocean Park has existed in this place (and before that in the Church of the Ascension in Crescent Beach) we have benefitted enormously from the tireless and selfless work and service of many, many dedicated parishioners. We wouldn't be here without those people who came before us. We are so grateful for them and for those who continue their work here today, in faithful service to our loving God, in Ocean Park. Even though we'd like to thank everyone personally for their blessed service to our church today, we know there are simply too many ministries to do that. These many Ministries serve our community and our whole church family: our children, our youth, adults, parents, seniors, girls, boys, men and women alike. If we tried to list all those ministries, we would invariably forget to mention someone. Let us simply thank all the members of the many ministries of St. Mark Ocean Park for all their faithful service to our parish and our awesome God.

Below are some of the things we've accomplished together during the past year.

In February/March, we added to our wonderful team of staff: John Mash as our assistant priest, Steve Bailey as Deacon and Beverly Neville as our new Choir Director.

In March, Parish Council confirmed that St. Mark would sponsor two refugees from Syria. This commitment became a reality when, in answer to our prayers, we were finally able to meet Fouad and Lewa at our Salmon Barbeque in September. God bless them, and all the work our Refugee committee has done, and is doing, in giving St. Mark a second opportunity to open our hearts and sponsor another Syrian Refugee family in 2017.

In March, Parish Council started a new Creation Care ministry and Anne Schreck was affirmed to head it up. During the past year, Creation Care has done God's work to protect our environment in many ways. We are excited that this new ministry has mobilized efforts to recycle scrap metal and organize work parties to take care of the forested area on our property. We look forward to future endeavours by this important ministry.

In March we added signs saying "We Welcome You" in Chinese to both of our permanent church signs on 20th Avenue.

We held a work party to review boxes of paper files that were no longer needed. We kept anything of archival value, but shredded and recycled those financial records that were no longer required (Canada Revenue Agency obliges us to keep paper copies for the past seven years).

We came to an agreement with two community groups (Ocean Park Community Association and Camp Alexandra House) for them to use our parking lot as an alternate site at which to meet in case of a natural disaster or emergency. One group can use the east part of the parking lot and the other group can use the west part. The

groups only need to use our parking lot, not our buildings. Both groups confirmed that they have liability insurance that covers us.

As there was no Diocesan Synod in 2016, on May 14 a group from St. Mark attended a wonderful Missions Conference hosted by Musqueam leaders and elders on their traditional lands bordering the Fraser River near UBC. We also got a chance to see Rev. Denise Doerksen who is doing well in her new church St. David's Tsawwassen.

Those people in our Parish who needed to renew their Screening In Faith attended a Sexual Misconduct workshop on May 28 lead by Rich Phillip.

In May funds were raised to help support the people displaced in the White Rock Five Corners fire.

At the end of May we received word from Bishop Melissa Skelton that Lynne Hurd had been confirmed as St. Mark Ocean Park's 2016 recipient of the Order of the Diocese of New Westminster. Lynne received the award at a wonderful ceremony in November. Subsequent to this, the Diocesan council decided to award the Order of the Diocese of New Westminster once every two years. The next time that the ODNW will be awarded will be 2018.

We are so blessed to have incredibly gifted and knowledgable people in our parish. In February/March Deacon Steve Bailey conducted a six-part Lenten experience on Anglican Heritage and contemporary reality. Mary Brown, Betty Bear and Barb Grantham held courses on Healthy Living for people with chronic pain/conditions. Scott and Miriam Tolhurst lead two wonderful seminars in 2016: "Change of Heart" in March and "The Spirit of Galatians" on the September 30 and October 1 weekend. As well, Mark Davies held four popular sessions to discuss topics concerning "Modern Mental Health"; "Stress", "Anxiety", "Depression", and "Positive Psychology". We'd love to have Steve, Mary, Betty, Barb, Scott, Miriam and Mark host more seminars for us in 2017.

In 2016 the Diocese requested that we respond to two surveys. In March, Anne Schreck collated the congregation's opinions on the role that clergy, parents, godparents, parishes and the diocese should take with respect to confirmation. In June, Parish Council submitted responses to a "Gathering the Mind of the Community" Assessment Task Force Survey. The survey asked Council to rank in priority those ministries at the Diocesan level. The survey also asked for feedback about the Diocesan Assessment and the levels of assessment for congregations of various sizes. In October a conference at St. Dunstan's Langley was held to discuss some of the survey's findings.

In June, after serving for 4 months, Beverly Neville stepped down as choir director. She and the choir were doing great work, but Beverly found the commute from Vancouver too much for her. We trusted in God and he provided us Emily Worden-Kwok as our new choir director in August. Since September, Emily has worked with the adult choir, is helping with the Praise Team, restarted the Children's Choir, and in December, assisted Linda Zeal and the Sunday School with the music during the Children's Christmas pageant, which was awesome! Congratulations to Emily and Annabelle for all the positive comments we've received in the past few months about our music.

In August, Linda Zeal lovingly organized a very successful Vacation Bible School. We're hopeful that Vacation Bible School will be able to run again in 2017.

Our battle with silverfish is still continuing. We spread diatomaceous earth on the baseboard in all areas around the church, especially in "hot spots" like the choir room, kitchen, bathrooms, etc. and this has certainly helped. We'd ask groups in the church to continue using plastic containers for storage, rather than cardboard boxes, which can be an unwitting food source for silverfish.

We requested a bus bench for the bus stop on our property on 20th Avenue. The City of Surrey kindly delivered a bench right away.

The Sound Ministry has gone through some changes after their leader, Brian Maxwell, moved to Chilliwack. A few new members have joined the Sound Ministry, which is in transition at this time.

In November and December, we received great support from the Peace Arch News. Alex Browne read "A Christmas Carol", by Charles Dickens on Dec. 9. Unfortunately the snowy weather limited attendance, but not the enjoyment, that evening. Everyone was very impressed with Alex' dramatic reading and asked if he would be able to do the reading again next year. Alex is keen to do that, so we've tentatively penciled him in for Friday Dec. 8, 2017. Alex's reading of "A Christmas Carol" was sponsored by our "Journey of Christmas" ministry, which, as you know, is a great blessing to our community. For many families in our community, a walk through our "Journey" is an annual tradition for them, one that begins their celebration of Christmas.

In conclusion, I'd like to allude to two lines from the St. Mark Ocean Park Ministry Description for the People's Warden.

- Experience the satisfaction of creating a safe, welcoming environment in which to worship and serve God
- Explore your own spiritual gifts and deepen your commitment to Christ

I hope that, during the past three years, in some small measure I, along with all the many people working together at St. Mark Ocean Park, have been able to accomplish the first statement. I know that I have definitely experienced the second in my personal life.

It has truly been an honour and privilege to serve God and this congregation for the past three years as your People's Warden. But, I'm not going anywhere, so I get to continue doing God's work in this place, but I simply get to wear "a different hat".

PEOPLE'S WARDENS REPORT - Ken Miles

I have always believed that God has preordained a task for each of us. In my case it was the preservation of the grounds and the building structure of St. Mark's. I believe that if we are to be good stewards of what God has given us, we must take everything he has given us and when we depart either leave what he gave us as we received it or preferably we improve upon it. With the previous thoughts in mind, the year of 2016 has been a good start but still has room to continue.

In late spring, the church was approached by two different associations to use our property each with a different intent. The first association was the Ocean Park Community Association Emergency Preparedness Subcommittee who wanted to use the grounds of St. Mark's as a gathering location for the people of Ocean Park in case of a disaster. This request of using the total grounds excluding the interiors of any of the church buildings was granted. The second association was the Boy Scouts who wanted to locate their storage container on the church property. After a small amount of negotiations, the scouts and St. Mark's entered into a land lease agreement in that the Scouts would pay the church a nominal fee (\$1.00 per year) and perform two days a year of volunteer labour to clean up the church grounds to the north of the church.

The preservation of the envelope of the church buildings must be protected. With this in mind and a recent history of leaks in various parts of the sanctuary, it was decided to replace the old roof on the hall with a new one of a torch-on type and to recaulk all the windows and to inspect and repair all the flashing as necessary in the Sanctuary. This work was completed in late summer and to date it would appear to have been very successful with no apparent leaks.

As a result of this repair to the roof, it would appear that it is time to repaint the walls and ceiling of the Sanctuary. This repainting is the major project of the year 2017.

As many of you know the old wood sheds, used to store garden equipment, etc., are susceptible to wood rot and require being painted. Don Hamilton's idea of replacing these sheds with one shipping container modified for our use was acted upon and is now in place. The inside of the container will be adapted over the next few months to become a very valuable resource for storage and working on church items. This one time cost of \$10,000 for the container could potentially save us from replacing any sheds for at least the next 50 years and probably a lifetime or more.

In addition to the major capital expenses, two failures of essential pieces of equipment in the kitchen have consumed a large amount of maintenance time and cost in order to allow the kitchen is keep operating. The new cooler (refrigerator) and especially the new dishwasher consumed a lot of hours due to redesign in order to meet our requirements. In both cases annual maintenance contracts were taken out to try to improve the longevity of the equipment.

Efforts to reduce our annual costs in regards to lighting continues, but at a slower pace as florescent and CFL bulbs are replaced with LEDs.

During the month of June, Anne Schreck took on the position of Chair of the gardening committee and this committee was absorbed into her Creative Care Committee. This has resulted in a more coordinated approach to the church grounds which over the future years will yield benefits as the grounds mature.

The kitchen committee continues to function in a coordinated approach with the various groups who use the kitchen. The last inspection by Fraser Health was passed with only one minor comment which will be dealt with shortly. Both Roberta Braddock and Isabel Chernoff are to be congratulated for their work on the committee and for taking over the inspections by Fraser Health and other associations that are concerned with the kitchen.

The year 2017 will not be as busy as 2016 as capital expenses will be limited to three or four smaller items such as re-flooring the offices, repainting the Sanctuary and possibly fixing the retaining wall to the east of the Hall. Blessings,

CHILDRENS' MINISTRY REPORT

During 2016 we continued to use the lectionary-based program "Roots". Subjects covered with the children included the Epiphany, Luke's gospel where John the Baptist tells about the Messiah, Jesus being baptized by John and receiving the Holy Spirit, Jesus' first miracle of turning water into wine, Jesus attending the synagogue in Nazareth claiming Isaiah's prophesy about the Messiah being fulfilled in him, and the peoples' anger when He teaches in the synagogue.

The children and youth had a pancake and fruit breakfast the first Sunday in February with a discussion about Lent. The following week they learned about Jesus being led by the spirit into the wilderness, being tempted by the Devil for 40 days but resisting. Then they learned of Jesus' refusal to turn back from Jerusalem after being told by some Pharisees of Herod's plan to kill him, and predicting he would die there. The month concluded with an intergenerational service.

In March they learned of the Parable of the Prodigal Son. Palm fronds were handed out on Palm Sunday and we talked about all the events that happened during Easter week. Easter Sunday was an intergenerational service and a children's talk with Rev. Craig.

April began by exploring how Jesus meets needs differently, voicing doubts, unlocking fears, and receiving the gift of the Spirit. Other lessons during the month included how the risen Jesus helped the disciples catch fish and invited the disciples for breakfast, forgiving Simon Peter his denial, telling some Pharisees that he is the Messiah, but they don't believe him. Rebecca gave a children's talk at an intergenerational service and the children sang a song from a prior VBS "Love the Lord", tying in with the message about Jesus giving a new commandment – Love one another.

May was Missions Month and our motto was "Roll up your sleeves for Jesus". Kate Hoos talked about the various missions the Children's Ministry supports, including the "Lunch Bags for Kids Program" through the Food Bank. We surpassed our goal of 60 by assembling 76 bagged lunches by the end of May. Our Mother's Day gifts were completed and distributed to all the "church mothers" on Mother's Day. The youth and their leader Josh conducted the children's program the following week with good interaction and great success. Pentecost Sunday was an intergenerational service including a children's talk. The final lesson for the month was from Luke 7 about the Gentile centurion asking Jesus to heal his slave and a discussion about faith and what it meant to the children.

June started with Environment Day and a talk by Anne Schreck about the environment and how each one of us can do a part to protect it. The next week we learned all about how a sinful woman washed Jesus' feet with her tears and dried them with her hair, poured on oil and how he forgave her of her sins so she could go in peace. The last day of Sunday school we had a movie and popcorn session and the Fathers' Day gifts that the children had made were given out to all the church fathers during the last hymn.

Barbara Walks organized and arranged volunteer teachers and helpers for the 10 week Summer Sunday School program. Many thanks Barbara for a job well done!

Vacation Bible School was held towards the end of August with a week-long program called Cave Quest which was well attended and a great success.

Our school year Sunday School start-up was Sept. 11th when we learned about two parables Jesus told about finding things that were lost (Luke 15). Banners were made about rejoicing and celebrating and were hung in the Education Centre. Our annual hot dog social was Sept 18th supervised by Kate Hoos assisted by the 9 and 10 year olds and some of our youth, as well as Rick Hoos, our barbequer extraordinaire. Many thanks and well done, another successful hot dog social for our church family. The younger children learned about Jesus telling his disciples about a man who was dishonest but wise and encouraging his disciples to focus on God and not money. We celebrated National Forest Week and National Tree Planting Day on Sept.25th by having the children plant their very own trees. This was arranged by Anne Schreck who had them prepare by writing their names on plastic ribbon and tying them on stakes to identify their trees. Thank you Anne.

October was eventful and included lessons from Luke 17 about the disciples asking Jesus how they can make their faith bigger and how to be good servants and from Luke 18 about the proud Pharisee and humble tax collector who both go to the temple to pray. A thanksgiving discussion and short movie was included. Tom and Stephanie Mackie and friends brought their dogs to perform agility training and small circus acts. The children learned how to stay safe around dogs with a short meet and greet. A big thanks to Tom and Stephanie. On Oct.30th we talked about the history of All Hallows Eve, All Saints Day, and All Souls Day. The children then had a chance to carve a pumpkin each to take home. Many thanks to the youth as well as Geoff Higginson, Chris Simmons, and Cameron McPherson for supervising the pumpkin carving.

The children remained upstairs and were included in the November Remembrance Day service and Rev. Craig gave a children's talk. On Nov.13th we talked about Jesus telling his disciples that the Temple in Jerusalem would be destroyed. COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY REPORT

Your Community Outreach Ministry undertakes to provide weekly, monthly or annual support to provide a 'hand up' to several members of our community. These include, Single Mothers and their young children, Senior Women, Soup Lunches for Disabled Women, Young parents and their babies, and young men struggling with addiction are all the recipients of your generosity.

These members of our community receive assistance directly from the parishioners of St. Marks Ocean Park. Without your financial support and your support of 'Souper Sunday' all of the following would not be possible.

The direction of your Community Outreach Ministry is guided by the Mission Statement taken from St. Matthew, Chapter 25, verses 35 to 40 as follows:

I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me water
I was a stranger and you took me in;
Naked and you clothed me; ill and you comforted me;
In prison and you visited me.
And the King said, "what you do to the least of these my people, you do unto me".

History:

The late Pat Louis, a strong and vibrant parishioner of St. Mark's began this Ministry in early 1999. This Ministry was originally called "The Front Room" -- a shelter in Whalley -- did for those who are homeless, mentally ill or struggling with addiction.

It began with teams making sandwiches in the church kitchen and serving them at the Front Room in Whalley. The Community Outreach Ministry has grown and is now supporting the various organizations and programs outlined in this report.

At the end of that first year, the 'Front Room Ministry' had \$2000.00 in operating funds. As of 2016, the Community Outreach Ministry supports projects both here in the South Surrey area and at the Front Room in Whalley, and now has an operating budget of \$11,000.16

LEADERSHIP

The planning and administering of the programs are the responsibility of the Steering Committee which is comprised of members of the congregation: Barbara Grantham (Chair), Pat Aiken, Betty-Ann Bainbridge, Roberta and John Braddock, Lynne Brownridge, Ann Colman, Lawrence Hurd, Alvin Myhre, Shannon Poulsen, and Darlene Wiegand.

INCOME & EXPENDITURE

The past year's financial support came from the following sources: the Parishioners of St. Mark's, Women's Evening Guild, the Sunday School and the Men's Club. The Souper Sunday sales have enabled this Ministry to provide some 'extras' for the groups currently supported.

The following financial statement documents funds received and the distribution of these funds to each project. It should be noted that the Community Outreach Ministry operates on a receipts-based reimbursement for any and all expenditures.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS --- 2016

Throughout 2016, your Community Outreach Ministry continued to meet with the organizations supported through the Ministry. Programs are reviewed to ensure that what is being provided to each organization is what is best suited for their needs. Representatives from these organizations are invited to attend Ministry meetings to discuss their organizations and challenges they face on a regular basis

Lunch Basket for Hungry Children

The Lunch Basket for Hungry Children Program currently provides support to five Single Mothers whose children and youth would otherwise go to school hungry, along with a grandmother who cares for her three grandchildren on a full time basis. These families are identified to St. Marks from Women's Place and reviewed on a regular basis.

- > Safeway Gift Cards to the value of \$15.00/child per week are distributed monthly to young Mothers to purchase food for their children.
- Extra Gift cards for special holidays such as Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas are provided to the families who participate in the Lunch Basket Program for Hungry Children. These families can enjoy some extras at these holiday times as do others in the community.
- Christmas Dinner Gift Cards for Safeway were provided to these families in the Lunch Basket for Hungry Children Program this year. This change was due to special food and diet considerations for the families.

Financial support for the Lunch Basket is received through contributions made by St. Marks parishioners. The Donor Pledge Calendar posted in the Parish Hall is where these pledges can be made. A thanksgiving or Memorial donation is recognized weekly in the Parish Pulse.

Thank you to Shannon Poulsen, who delivers these Gift cards each month to Women's Place and to Darlene Wiegand cares for the Donor Pledge Calendar. Thank you to both of these ladies for their ongoing effort to keep the program running smoothly.

The Protein Fund

Stan Hodgson, a long-time member of St. Marks originated this program to purchase high protein food for those who participate in the 'Lunch Basket' program. Beef, chicken and pork and other high protein foods are purchased with donations received from within the parish. These 'Protein' packets are made up and delivered to Women's Place.

In addition to the participants in the Lunch Basket program, a single mother with an adult disabled daughter also receives this high protein package. This lady was also referred to this Outreach Ministry through Women's Place.

Thank you to Roberta Braddock for her dedicated time and organization of this program.

Christmas Hampers

Each year, those families who are participants of the Lunch Basket Program and The Protein Fund receive Christmas Hampers. These Hampers are organized by the Outreach Ministry and supplied by The Sunday School, Ladies Evening Guild, ACW, Bible Studies and the Outreach Ministry itself. Gift Cards are given early in December, so that the parents have the opportunity to purchase gifts for their children, and food for their Christmas dinners.

Thank you to Ann Colman for organizing and delivering these cards.

Women's Place - Soup Making & Delivery Ministry

Each and every Wednesday of the month, a soup lunch for Disabled Women is made by a dedicated group of parishioners. This homemade soup is delivered to Women's Place by these dedicated people. The following members of the congregation make and deliver the soup: Betty Ann Bainbridge, Isabel Chernoff, Ann Colman, Janet Cormode, Maggie Ferguson, Insa Fricker, Fran Friedel, Jamie Grantham, Jean Hornstein, Lynne Brownridge, Debbie Maxwell, Michelle Palmer, Shannon Poulsen, Mary Thirsk, Toni Wallis and Linda Zeal.

Thank you to Betty-Ann Bainbridge for coordinating this Ministry.

The Blanche Biddle Trust Fund.

The Blanche Biddle Trust Fund is used to support Single Mothers and children who need a 'hand up' in a temporary basis. This past year funds have also been used to support the Lunch Basket Program. We were also able to purchase extra Christmas gift items for some students at Old Yale Road Elementary School.

This program was pioneered by the Outreach Committee eight years ago with the original donor, Blanche Biddle. The breakfast program started in just one school. The program was so successful, that the Surrey School District has now taken it over by obtaining special funding from the province for qualified school communities.

Thank you to Alvin Myhre who has coordinated and overseen this program.

Stepping Stones

Stepping Stones is a non-profit organization which welcomes all pregnant and parenting youth between the ages of 12 and 24. Most of these young parents come from unsupportive homes and have nowhere to turn for support. These young Moms are faced with overwhelming odds and challenges. Young Mothers and now Young Fathers attend programs to improve their circumstances.

Monthly funding was provided to Stepping Stones for young Mothers to purchase diapers, and for bus tickets for these young parents to attend workshops and support groups at this non-profit organization.

AMA Transition House

AMA Transition House is the first transition house of its kind in Canada. Accessible to women 55+ who are experiencing abuse – AMA House serves a community where the number of seniors per capita is twice the national average. There are no geographical limitations for access. This 'First Stage' residential care home provides immediate assistance to Senior Women in need.

Monthly funding provides bus tickets and personal items for women who are residents of AMA House.

We now have some volunteers from St. Marks who visit AMA House, visiting and teaching the women how to knit and crochet.

Funding for Fresh Vegetables

This past year, \$100.00 each quarter was sent to both Women's Place and the South Surrey Food Bank for fresh vegetables. This program was originated to replace the fresh vegetables delivered from Arocha. The funding enables both the Food Bank and Women's Place to purchase vegetables on a regular basis at a reasonable price.

'Souper' Sunday 2016

Souper Sunday continues to be a wonderful success. During the cooler months of the year members of the Community Outreach Ministry gather together to prepare homemade soups. We are blessed to have skilled shoppers, choppers and sellers!

The Committee members meet on the Saturday to prepare soup for Sunday morning sales. This homemade soup is for sale after both the 8:00 am and 10:00 am services.

The 'Souper Sunday' project has been able to assist in purchasing and delivering items on 'wish lists' to the following organizations:

AMA House

Pyjamas and slippers purchase for both current residents, and those newly

arriving clients.

Launching Pad

Purchase of new roasting pans and a large rice cooker.

Stepping Stones

Funding was provided to purchase books about the true meaning of Christmas. This was to provide each child a gift who were attending the Annual Christmas Dinner for these young parents and their extended families. 200 people

attended this dinner.

South Surrey/White Rock

Food Bank

Again this year, all soup sales for January and February were donated to the Food Bank -- as these two months at the Food Bank are the slower donation

months of the year.

Thank you to Roberta Braddock for shopping for all of the soup supplies and organizing the soup preparation in the kitchen.

ON-GOING PROJECTS AT 'THE FRONT ROOM'

These programs are on going which the Community Outreach Ministry supports on a regular basis.

Projects Delivered at the Front Room Homeless Shelter

- \$300.00/month is donated to the Djaeff Mahler Food Bank (Positive Haven) located at the 'Front Room'. This is a high protein food bank for those living with HIV and AIDS.
- Small toiletries are collected and delivered to the Front Room. A basket with a list of preferred items is located in the Narthex.

The Food Bank basket located in the Narthex is for food and used wearable clothing may be placed. A list of preferred food is attached to the basket.

CREATION CARE MINISTRY REPORT

Thank you to the many parishioners and others who have helped us in our journey to uphold our Baptismal vow as we care for and renew God's creation gift to us. From the dedicated gardeners extraordinaire, the Tuesday morning 'Back Forest' crew, the Scouts clean-up crew, the Sunday School children's Tree Planting, the Enhanced Recycling Programme, to surveying the safety & integrity of the forest, the Metal Recycling Drives, the First Fruits Garden Project and so much more, we shall continue our challenge to improve our stewardship of our physical resources while reducing everything possible from entering the landfill.

St. Mark's Garden Committee

In the Spring a group of our avid gardeners met with People's Warden Ken Miles and decided that the oversight of St. Marks' gardens would come under the 'umbrella' of the Creation Care Ministry. There have been many challenges with the very early spring, very dry summer followed by a very wet Fall & current harsh winter conditions. We shall continue to replenish the gardens with additional soil and continue in our aim to reduce water consumption through water wise plants and considering further drip watering systems. We welcome all skills and time offered to plant, water, weed and to dead-head God's gardens.

'Back Forest Work Party' – Tuesdays May through October 9-11:00am 3-7 people gathered each Tuesday morning to work around the property to clean up in the forest, reduce the fire load, clear areas for new trees, remove ivy, prune, and to assist with removal of the shed. Gardens and forest are 'works-in-progress'. We welcome all who wish to join in this year's projects as we continue work in the west parking lot and continue our work to reclaim buried tree trunks.

St. Mark's Scout Troup

In November the scouts pitched in with their energy and enthusiasm for the Fall clean-up in the forest & around the grounds. They had a great deal of fun & hilarity while working on their commitment and lending us their muscle!

Sunday School Tree Planting

Two Sundays this year the children focused specifically on caring for God's creation. For National Tree Day in September many of the children had great fun labeling, staking & planting 25 Western Red Cedar saplings that they will continue to monitor and enjoy. These trees are close enough to the church to be well watered until they can be transplanted throughout the forest or property where needed.

Enhanced Recycling & Metal Recycling

We are continuing our efforts to streamline the recycling at St. Mark's following the City of Surrey By- Laws and supplementing these efforts with the further collection of church waste in the form of plastic grocery bags, packing styrofoam, light bulbs, batteries & small appliances that are collected in the wooden cupboard outside the East wall of the kitchen. These collections are for church waste only – and are taken to the Recycling Depot for appropriate recycling. Only St. Mark's spring & fall Metal Recycling projects are for gathering & collecting all forms of metal at the church. This year we kept more than 1TON of mixed metals out of the landfill!!! Well done and thank you all!

Our greatest challenge for 2017 (and beyond) is to reduce our use of plastic and styrofoam. We are exploring a substitute for the black plastic and the styrofoam used in the parish this year. A new corn based product may be a viable and more eco-friendly substitute for use at the BBQ's & the Childrens' Hot Dog Social.

The First Fruits Garden Project - No Project in 2017

We are grateful to all who have participated in making this fund raising project such an amazing success. Over the past 8 years thousands of dollars have been raised for our many forms of outreach while so many tasty fruits,& vegetables have been enjoyed. There's hardly a parishioner who hasn't taken home some of the magnificent flowers grown in our folk's gardens or here at St. Marks. This has been a wonderful experience while raising much needed funds to care for others. God has so blessed us that we might be His Blessings to others. Thank you all.

DONATIONS SECRETARY REPORT

Once again it is that time of the year when we look back on the prior year to see whether there are any lessons to be learned so that we can improve the way we record donations and make our system more efficient. We order 140 weekly envelope sets and 80 monthly envelope sets and there appears to be no change necessary. As in prior years for various reasons on average about 20 weekly and 12 monthly envelope numbers become available for re-allocation in the New Year. This year many donors used pew envelopes and perhaps it would be of interest to all donors to learn how we process weekly/monthly/PAD/pew envelopes and all other donations to arrive at the end of year and print Tax Receipts for all accumulated donations \$20 or more.

After 'the counters' have emptied all cheques and cash from the envelopes and banked all donations the envelopes are collected by the Donation Secretary for processing. Where pew envelopes have been used these are cross-referenced to a master number list and the allocated number recorded; if the donor is 'new' then a number is allocated. This system allows us to issue Tax Receipts for all donations above \$20.

In 2016 41 newcomers donated through pew envelopes and there were another 59 carried over from 2015. During the year several of these 'newcomers' decided to donate through either PAD or weekly or monthly envelopes and another 50+ have continued to donate using pew envelopes.

As mentioned in the 2015 report when you look at the comparative figures there is just one item that requires explanation, note that years 2012 and 2013 there were "Capital Renewal (WRF)" campaigns, and in 2013 the campaign had been completed and so these donations to Capital (WRF) should not be compared with those of 2014 onwards.

On behalf of Irene Snow, we thank all members of the "Counters Teams" for their dedication to duty.

All donations are received in the strictest confidence and are receipted for income tax purposes at year-end. The following summarizes the financial donations by the parishioners of St. Mark, Ocean Park in 2016 with comparative figures for 2015, 2014, 2013 and 2012. Note that items marked with an * are included in the total for that specific section.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The year 2016 was a very successful year financially and also a very fulfilling year with much accomplished with our brigade of volunteers. Without major catastrophes, we were able to focus on proactive projects for the future.

The Operating Fund Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 2016, reflects our steadfastness.

I appreciate and thank every ministry and their leaders for their good financial stewardship. In addition to the operating contributions and revenue, we also received \$7,460.00 in Capital Funds, \$48,117.73 in contributions to Community Outreach, Syrian Family Sponsorship, PWRDF and other ministries

This is not including funds raised by ACW, Evening Guild and Men's Club – as always, well done good and faithful servants! The Parish of St. Mark - Ocean Park is richly blessed by your love and faithfulness of the countless hours of "Time and Talent" to which many, many volunteer so willingly and faithfully contribute. For this, we give God all the praise and glory!

Total GIC Investments at year end is \$460,966.39. It was necessary to redeem GICs in the amount of \$30,000.00 to provide the cash flow for the capital projects done during the year. Capital expenses of \$88.226.51 was disbursed for New Hall Roof, Sanctuary Roof Repairs, New Refrigerator, Dishwasher Booster, Storage Container, Sump Pump and Church Signage.

Notes to the Financial Statement and Budget

Cash:

Our ending cash balance is \$30,212.06, which I believe is sufficient for the monthly cash flow.

Investments:

The yearend balance of \$460,966.39 for Investments represent "Trust Funds" for Ministry Programs, Youth and Children's Ministries, Bequests and Capital Funds and Operating Surplus. At the 2016 yearend, our surplus operating funds are \$20,710.57. During the year \$30,000.00 of our investments were redeemed to finance the Capital Expenses.

Receivables:

P.A.D. (Pre Authorized Deposit) Receivable of \$10,097.00 is applied to our monthly remittance to the Diocese for payroll and the Diocesan Assessment, reducing our monthly payment.

GST Receivable of \$1,244.73 is the expected refund for the second half of 2016.

Accrued Interest - interest earned to December 31, 2016 on the GICs.

Fixed Assets:

Changes in Church Buildings and Improvements are the additions of Capital Improvements less depreciation for the year. As a note of interest, on the 2017 Property Assessment Notice, the Assessed Value is \$7,746,800.

Liabilities:

Accrued Accounts Payables are the Year End Accounting fees of \$3,600.00, Damage Deposit of \$2,000.00 for the Rector and \$500.00 deposit for Funeral Service

Fund Balances:

By reviewing the Report of Fund Balances, one can clearly see the Balances brought forward from prior year (Opening Balance), Total Income and Total Expenses for the year giving the Closing Balance of each Fund and Ministry at year end.

Income:

Contributions for 2016 decreased by \$3,289.61, and the Revenue decreased by \$9,200.08 with a net income reduction of \$12,489.69. The total income for the year was over budget by \$12,294.79.

Expenses:

While Operating and Ministry expenses were under budget by \$4,519.51, Total expenses plus our surplus income for the year resulted in a net surplus of \$16,814.30.

Budget 2017

The proposed 2017 budget for Envelope Contributions has been increased by \$10,250.00. Expenses have been analyzed to reflect the realistic cost of operations with a net increase of \$1753.00. The decrease in revenue forecast is miscellaneous revenue received in 2015 from staff benefit refund which was a one-time receipt. Therefore the amount of Contributions required by parishioners has increased for the operation of the parish.

This Budget was approved by Finance Committee and Parish Council for presentation for approval at Vestry.

677 people came through this year. Three groups cancelled on us because of the snow and icy conditions, which decreased our numbers by at least 100 people. Over 90% of our visitors do not attend St. Mark's, which shows the strength of this community outreach.

Sheila has already booked Sat. April 29 for a work party. The 2017 dates are the same as last year from Dec. 15-24. Please help us to continue to bring the true spirit of Christmas to our wonderful community.

KITCHEN COMMITTEE REPORT

This has been a very eventful year in our community kitchen. It is well designed and gets much use. We have a few upgrades to report. First, the current church water heater was not able to heat water fast enough and to the correct temperature to meet the food safe requirements for washing dishes for large events. The Wardens successfully had a hot water booster installed which heats the dishwasher water as needed to the correct temperatures. This enables us to meet the health inspector's standards.

As a result of the extra heat in the dishwasher we have removed the many plastic serving dishes from the kitchen. We would ask that groups use glass or stainless steel which can be properly sterilized in the dishwasher.

The second issue that the health inspector stressed was that the vent system on the stove hood needed to be professionally cleaned once a year. This has been done for the first time.

Our gas range has been acting up and the parts for the repairs are very difficult to acquire. Apparently the stove is quickly becoming obsolete. We will need to look at a replacement stove in the coming years.

Thirdly, we are having difficulty cleaning the venetian blinds in the kitchen. It might be wise to look at replacing them with roller blinds in the future, as these will be easier to manage and clean.

The microwave was replaced this year. A new set of smaller dessert bowls were purchased. The storage space in the kitchen was reconfigured and labelled, allowing for greater efficiency in dish and glass storage. Olive spearheaded the collection of Safeway knives, which are now a well used addition to the food preparation program.

The pantry is now in full operation. Many of the larger items which are used only a few times a year are now placed on well labelled shelves. Each user group is vigilant in returning clean items for proper storage.

We currently have ten plastic storage containers of tablecloths. User groups are encouraged to clean these properly before folding and storing them for future use. Please discard torn or stained cloths.

The use of bleach in cleaning all surfaces and containers is recommended to discourage pathogens. All food sources should be labelled and stored in sealed containers. Nothing is to be left on counters. Foods in the fridge and freezer must be dated and labelled by organizations. The stale-dated ones will be discarded.

We are very pleased with the consistent cleanliness and organization the user groups take with our kitchen and pantry. We would like to thank you for your awareness and vigilance in dealing with our critter issues. Our kitchen is a model of efficiency that supports endless varieties of hospitality in serving both church and community. A very valuable ministry shared by all!



PASTORAL CARE MINISTRY REPORT

SPONSOR CHILD REPORT

We read in Hebrews "Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God."

More than fifty children around the world are sponsored by members of St. Mark Ocean Park. You can see some of the children's photos on the display board in the hall. One sponsor is all it takes to make a change in the world.

"More than nine million children around the world are sponsored by Western donors and a major new report on the work of one aid agency has found that sponsorship does improve children's lives. It has reopened a long and fierce debate over whether this hugely popular form of giving to the poor is either ethical or effective.

Academics from the University of San Francisco decided to undertake the most wide-ranging study yet in six developing countries - Bolivia, Guatemala, India, Kenya, the Philippines, and Uganda.

They interviewed more than 10,000 adults and looked at the lives of those who had been sponsored as children by the agency, Compassion, and compared them to their peers who hadn't been sponsored.

The results showed that the sponsored children stayed in school longer than their non-sponsored peers, were more likely to have white collar jobs and were more likely to be leaders in their communities and churches.

In Uganda the impact on education was particularly striking. The sponsored children were 42% more likely to finish secondary education than those not part of the program, and 83% more likely to complete university." Quote from Emily Buchanan, BBC world affairs correspondent

SYRIAN REFUGEE COMMITTEE REPORT

It was a busy and productive year for the Parish of St. Mark, Ocean Park Syrian Refugee Committee. We began the year with hope that we would have a refugee family here by Easter, but this proved to be overly optimistic. In March of 2016, the Federal Government suddenly announced the end of the official Syrian Refugee effort, and Syrian refugees would now be considered under the same program as any other refugee, without the expedited process they previously enjoyed. This promised to be a long and arduous process.

About this same time we presented a proposal to the Clergy and Wardens Committee, and to Parish Council, at the request of the Diocesan Coordinator for the refugee effort, to partially support a senior couple from Syria who also receives support from their family, and to fully support a family of 5, also from Syria. This proposal had the full support of the Refugee Committee, and was fully supported by both the Clergy and Wardens Committee and by Parish Council. We were off on our path!

The Parish opened their hearts and were generous in their support, in both cash donations and donations of furniture and household items, and especially emotional and prayer support. The Parish had the chance to meet the family of the senior couple throughout the spring and summer, and we were blessed to receive Fouad Elia and Lewa Ashqar into Canada in early September! After 6 months of little activity for us, September and early October suddenly became very busy! Teams of people gathered the necessary items for Fouad and Lewa's home, and a group of men moved them into their apartment in New Westminster (near their children and grandchildren) in the middle of October.

In late October, the entire family came to St. Mark's to thank us, and the power of what we did as a Parish became overwhelmingly evident – an extended family had been reunited for the first time in years! Parents, children and grandchildren were all together after years of separation, and they could finally celebrate the birth of Christ all together and in safety – praise God!

Fouad and Lewa are slowly adjusting to a new life in Canada, and as expected, this will take time. In addition to the financial support we currently give them (their rent for one year), we can further support them with friendship, as they could use some more friends. They would love to get together with anybody from St. Mark's for coffee, tea and English conversation. If this speaks to your heart, please let us know.

We still have a family of 5 waiting for a new life in Canada. They are Khaldoun Al Nouisser, his wife Samah and their 3 children Natali (16), Jamal (11) and Katherine (10). We are currently putting together the documentation package and plan on submitting it this month to the Federal Government. We do not anticipate their arrival before the end of the year – please pray for this family celebrating Christmas with us in 2017!

Financially, we are quite sound at this time with a fund balance of over \$20,000, which is more than enough to fulfill our commitment to Fouad and Lewa. However, we have committed to fully financially supporting the Al Nouisser family and for this we need to build this fund balance throughout 2017, so please prayerfully consider how much you can contribute financially to this important ministry, but not neglecting your usual financial support to the operations of our Parish. In terms of furniture and other items they will need, we will not begin to collect anything until we have a much better idea of their confirmed arrival date.

The Parish of St. Mark, Ocean Park, Syrian Refugee Committee is incredibly grateful to all those who have supported this important ministry with prayers, money, items and time. A whole host of people sprang to action in the fall – too many to name – to organize everything needed for Fouad and Lewa, and we deeply thank you. Most importantly, Fouad and Lewa, and their entire family thank you, for without you, their new life in safety and in Canada with their family would not be possible.

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT

"The law was brought in so that the trespass might increase. But where sin increased, grace increased all the more, so that, just as sin reigned in death, so also grace might reign through righteousness to bring eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Romans 5:20-21

When a new year comes – especially a new year of ministry – I find it encouraging and helpful to take a moment to look back and reflect on God's grace. To close the chapter on 2016, we read through the above passage in Romans 5, where St. Paul presents us with an image of two kingdoms—one defined by the reign of sin, the other by the reign of grace. We each thought of moments this past year where we fell short in our walk of faith with the Lord and where the reign of sin took hold, as well as the moments where God's all-sufficient grace broke through and drew us closer to Him. Looking back, we have the chance to enjoy God's grace in perspective of the bigger picture.

This year, the focus of our *ReThink Sunday* classes on Sunday mornings was to spend time in prayer, worship through song, and reflection on the Sunday's Gospel lesson. On a few occasions, the youth were led by others in our parish on Sunday morning. We continued to encourage youth to be involved in the Eucharistic ministry, readings ministry, children's ministry and other interests throughout the year. This year, we also participated in a regular rotation in leading intercessory prayers. It's been encouraging to see the maturity in our youth as they serve in these important roles in the life of our parish. We even had the great privilege of witnessing the baptism of one of our youth, Rick Cao, early in the year.

Thrive Tuesdays have continued to be a highlight each week. It offers a low-key, fun, and engaging time for us to grow in relationship with one another as we walk the journey of faith together. Early in the year, we concluded a study series on "Does God Exist?" and spent the rest of the year in a study through the Old Testament with the "Collaborate" curriculum. It was encouraging to see the depth of discussion and how the group matured both socially and spiritually, especially in our times of prayer and worship. One highlight from this past Fall was getting to meet and hear from our Deacon, the Rev. Steve Bailey. Throughout the year we also had the opportunity to take part in the Adopt-a-Street program, helping to keep our stretch of 20 Ave tidy while living out our call to servant leadership.

Outside our regular programming, our *Breakout Events* provided opportunities for youth to invite friends and have fun. Highlights included a Star Wars movie night, lasagna and games event, a trip to the Extreme Air Park, and the *Jesus, Life and World Religions* event with Ravi Zacharias in Vancouver. Over the summer we planned a girls' breakfast, attended Praise Fest (which was a first concert for some!), a BBQ and Bible study at Craig and Holly's followed by a walk along the beach, a day at Cultas Lake Waterslides, and a movie at the Twilight Drive-In theatre. This Christmas we held our 4th annual bowling and gift exchange party, with the Featherstone's hosting us with some great food as we celebrated the birth of our Saviour together.

As we look towards a new year of ministry at St. Mark's, we consider where God is leading each of us in our personal lives as in our shared ministry together. We can place our full hope in knowing that whatever situations we find ourselves in, the reign of grace through the work of Jesus Christ will always be with us.
