Barbara Carington Smith presented the Financial Reports for 2017 using a Powerpoint Presentation. She reviewed highlights from the documents including any major changes from the previous year. Details of the Financial documents can be found in the Annual Report on pages 28 - 31.

9. 2018 BUDGET

Barbara spoke to the proposed budget for 2018. Questions were asked and answered. Suggestion was made to encourage all contributors to increase their giving by 5% to eliminate the ongoing operations deficit.

Ken Miles spoke to the 5 year Capital Budget including plans to replace the Northwest exterior staircase this year (\$6,000) and to complete the roofing repairs on the flat roof sections that were not done when the hall roof was replaced (\$53,000)

MOTION: Moved Ken Miles, 2nd Roger Hussen that repairs to the Northwest exterior stairway and some flat roof sections of our buildings be approved as Capital Expenses for 2018 for approximately \$60,000. CARRIED

10. STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Bernie Schneider reviewed the work that the Stewardship Committee has been doing and encouraged everyone to Give Regularly and Give Significantly. Of the 250 households at St. Mark's, 80% give regularly and he encouraged the other 20% to consider giving regularly. 50 households have joined the PAD (Pre-Authorized Donation) and he encouraged others to do so as this is a very efficient way of managing donations.

11. THE SPIRIT TEAM

Ben Schmit introduced the Spirit Team of Craig, Jock Ferguson, Barbara Grantham, Ken Miles. They have been tasked with implementing the findings of the Strategic Planning Committee. He posed the question -- What is the best way to communicate in today's digital society -- text, email, facebook, snapchat?? The team is looking to improve communications at St. Mark's.

RECTOR'S REPORT

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

It is with a deep sense of joy and thanksgiving that I submit this report for the year 2018. We saw the loving hand of God's provision and blessing throughout the year. This report is a testimony of God's goodness.

The Lord has provided people. Our membership holds up strong and healthy. There is always the flow of transition as our beloved friends pass into the eternal kingdom. We will name them today in this Vestry. But God continues to bring others into our fold. So many of these new members have already taken up the mantle of volunteer ministry and leadership.

Our children's ministry has prospered well under the leadership of Linda Zeal. We enjoyed another summer of ministry to children with the help again of our summer intern, Kate Herron and the wild man from 8AM, Laurie Stephenson. The VBS grew significantly in its second summer with that leadership team. Children are being taught, loved and cared for in Christ Jesus!

Joshua Brown has developed a truly fine program of teaching and fun activities with our youth. A new batch came into the group at the beginning of the summer, having graduated from Sunday School. That group of youth brought new energy and friends into the mix and so our youth group keeps growing!

Pastoral Care is a vital area of ministry for our parish since we have a high percentage of elderly, shut-in and mobility challenged members. Lynne Hurd oversees her team of phone callers and visitors providing a network of care that is available to anyone in our parish who needs it.

Our clergy staff has transitioned with John's retirement and we welcomed Rev. Sue Foley-Currie to our team as an Honorary Assistant. She has offered a wonderful resource of ministry and support to us through her preaching and pastoral care. The further good news is, that although Rev. Mash is officially retired, he is still available for emergencies to preach and preside. He also continues to offer some time as a volunteer for pastoral care and visitation. Dorothy organized our annual Seniors Christmas Dinner again this year with a record-breaking attendance.

Worship is at the centre of our life together. We have seen the music team transition as the interim team of Emily and Cecilia became our ongoing music ministry team. Cecilia has been involved at many levels helping with the Sunday evening Taize services, the Journey of Christmas, our Men's Club BBQs and many other events. We have also had the blessing of music ministry from the whole Wong family!

Emily has brought new energy and creativity to our worship through her ingenuity and creativity. She pours enormous work into the choices of music for worship. She also gathers the resources to support all who are participating in planning, preparing and performing music. We have an eclectic Music Planning Team that meets quarterly to support Emily in the choosing of music for worship.

Our worship together is also supported by a large team of volunteers who are preparing and serving the Eucharistic meal, welcoming at the door, reading, praying, singing, playing instruments, running sound and serving in the kitchen. We are enormously indebted to these gifted and faithful volunteers.

I want to offer a special thank you to our Administrator, Sheila, who works quietly and steadily in the church office to support all of the ministries of our parish. She is an enormous blessing. Somehow she produces fine bulletins weekly, manages the extensive flow of calendar events, supports the many data processing and record keeping tasks and the list goes on and on. It is a big job and I am truly grateful for her.

In our baptismal covenant we promise to "continue in the Apostles' teaching." When I ask candidates what that means, most do not know that the Apostles' teaching are given to us in the Holy Scriptures. In order to follow them we must read and study the Bible. Our members are encouraged to read the Bible daily and we make a devotional available every quarter called, "Forward Day By Day." We also have several Bible studies that meet regularly throughout the week. It is my hope that we can expand the number of Bible studies offered in this coming year.

We have one of the finest church libraries I have ever seen in an Anglican church. It is well organized and promoted weekly in our Parish Pulse. Let me commend that library to you and encourage you to take advantage of it.

Last year our Lenten study was titled "Led By The Spirit." It was written and moderated by Rev. Shelagh Huston and led with the support of her leadership team. This study was superbly done and so popular that an afternoon group had to be offered in order to accommodate the numbers! This year again we are planning a very special Lenten Course titled, "A Fresh Walk On Ancient Paths." This course will be co-taught by Rev. Scott Tolhurst and Dr. Mark Davies. These two gifted teachers will lead us on a journey to learn about prayer from some of the classic pioneers of our faith.

We have also enjoyed some unique worship experiences this year. We used our forested cathedral, the outdoor chapel, not just once in September, but on Wednesday services throughout the summer. We celebrated again this year the Feast of St. Francis along with the blessing of our animal friends. But there was one new service that was entirely unique in our parish history. For the very first time we offered a blessing for motorcycles and their riders followed by a group ride out to Ft. Langley. What fun it was!

In May our parish was privileged to play a key role in the diocesan Mission Conference. A large number of our members were supporting and teaching at this event. It is a testimony of how many talented and dedicated people the Lord had given to us!

In the Spring my wife and I took 33 people, most of them members of our parish, on a pilgrimage journey to the Holy Land. We traveled throughout Israel and Jordan seeing and experiencing the land of the Bible and the historic places of our faith. We have heard their testimonies, not only of how memorable but also life-changing the experience has been.

Throughout the year, our Strategic Planning, Innovating, Recruiting and Implementation Team (SPIRIT) has continued to meet. They are pressing forward toward the goals and directives that we as a congregation have given them. Out of six priorities we established, they have focused their energies particularly on two, worship and communication. Our worship team has worked hard this year to offer increasingly creative and beautiful worship.

SPIRIT has developed, through the creative talent of Jock Ferguson, an outstanding E-Newsletter that has been produced almost monthly. These articles along with photos are telling the story of our life together. There is so much to share and this new tool has really raised the bar of communication in our parish. SPIRIT will be presenting to this Vestry a proposal for a new staff position that will focus on communication; on telling our story within our parish, to our diocese and to the larger community around us.

Philippians 4:19 says, "And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus." Once again God has provided for us all that we have needed in 2018. We have seen the financial needs met as the report from our Treasurer will testify. We owe special thanks to our Financial Stewardship Team, The Four 'B's, for a new and innovative way of giving through our home-built Donation Station. My heartfelt thanks to all of our faithful givers!!

We have seen God meet every need for leadership and volunteers in every area of ministry and they are many; buildings and property maintenance, kitchen, Altar Guild, Men's Club, ACW, Ladies Guild, just to name a few.

The nominations committee will present to us the names of those who have served and are willing to serve us as Parish Council Trustees and Wardens in the year ahead. God has supplied and will continue to meet every need, and every challenge that is ahead for this parish! This I believe with all my heart and soul, and I am so very deeply grateful for the gifts of life and service that have been offered by so many.

RECTOR'S WARDEN REPORT

In February, 2018 I attended a Diocesan sponsored conference put on by Music that Makes Community. They use oral methods of learning music that help reduce the paper used for Sunday Services. One of these pieces was the Introit "While We Are Waiting Come" used for our Advent services.

In May we celebrated Rev. John Mash's retirement from ministry with us and the Diocese. We are delighted to still have him and Dorothy sitting in the pews and helping out from time to time.

Along with many members of the Parish, I helped to hostess Inside Out Church, the Diocesan Mission Conference on May 26. It was a wonderful opportunity to connect with other members of the Diocese and to be inspired by the Holy Spirit.

I have enjoyed spending time with the children in Summer Sunday School and VBS, seeing how God is working in their lives. It is amazing to watch as they reach out to others (including those they don't know) with God's love. Thank you to Laurie Stephenson, Kate Herron, and their team of helpers.

A big thank you to Linda Zeal and her team of faithful volunteers; Heather Higginson, Judith Hardman, Lynn Reynolds, and Kate Hoos, for another fantastic year of Children's Ministry. The children and families really appreciate their enthusiasm, creative ideas, inspired teaching, hard work and love that they give throughout the year on Sundays, and other events through the year especially the inspiring Christmas Pageant. Many thanks also to Josh Brown for guiding and sharing with our youth. It has been wonderful to watch both the youth and children develop and mature in their faith.

I started working with the Screening In Faith materials. These include Ministry Descriptions, Criminal Record Checks, The Diocesan Sexual Misconduct Policy Training (now known as Safe Church), and the Diocesan Anti-Racism Policy Training. I have been working on Ministry Descriptions with various ministry leaders to make sure that the descriptions reflect the ministries. Almost all of them have been revised. A Diocesan Sexual Misconduct Policy training workshop led by Rich Phillips was well attended at St Mark's on Saturday, June 2. In the fall parish leaders attended workshops for the Diocesan Anti-Racism Policy training.

This fall after more than 2 years wait, God has called Maggie Ferguson as new coordinator for the Prayer Shawl Ministry. Many thanks to Mary Brown for many years of compassionate and faithful leadership.

October 12-14 with 6 other St Mark members, I attended Pro Mundi Vita. This was a Diocesan spiritual retreat on contemplative prayer held at Camp Elphinstone on the Sunshine Coast. The next one, now titled "Vita", is being held at Loon Lake Lodge Retreat Centre in Maple Ridge, on March 22-24, and this time requires no ferry. I highly recommend it to anyone looking for re-centering their relationship with God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit.

Saturday, Nov. 24, I attended Christmas on the Peninsula along with Rev. Sue Foley-Currie and at least 18 other St Mark folk. It is always a joy to get together and work with other Christians and community leaders in our community to publicly start the preparations for the Christmas season. Making crafts, reading of the Christmas story, the parade culminating in the arrival of baby Jesus, and the community caroling are my favourites.

The 20th annual Journey of Christmas is the highlight of my Advent season with St Mark's reaching out and welcoming the community to our church. Thank you to Rev. Craig for the privilege of asking me to serve, and to Ken among others for mentoring me.

PEOPLE'S WARDENS REPORT

To repeat a sentence in my first report for the year 2016, I have always believed that God has preordained a task for each of us. I also believe that if God gave us something we must pass it onto the next owner in better condition than we received it. With these two thoughts in mind, all of us began a journey three years ago that is not quite complete at this time but will be in the near future. You, the congregation provided the moral and financial support to allow Don Hamilton, Phil Tubbs, Alan Marsh, Anne Schreck and the undersigned to complete a massive rebuild of our buildings and grounds in just over three years.

Over the past year we have completed the re-roofing of the flat roofs that were not done two years ago. This means that the only roof structure that should need attention over the next 20 years is the steel roof over the sanctuary. In theory, this roof should last 50 years with periodic re-tightening of the retaining bolts. It is my understanding that these bolts were re-tightened some years ago and without a known date, it is only a guess as to when they have to be redone. This will probably be in the next ten years and will not be cheap.

In the past few months, the north and south east fire escapes have been rebuilt. The new escapes were built out of pretreated wood and painted prior to assembly. Attention was paid to the assembly of the stairs so that the wood would not come into contact with the earth. Due to this attention being paid to the building of the new stairs, they will last longer than the old stairs which was approximately 25 years.

In addition, the original irrigation system in the memorial garden, the garden along the front wall of the church and the dahlia and rose garden in the quadrangle was replaced with a drip system thus improving the efficiency of delivering water to the plants and reducing our costs.

There were several other minor maintenance problems including some work in the rectory which in the majority were dealt with by your maintenance staff of volunteers. In reality these people have saved us several thousand dollars over the past three years.

There is one more major item to be done around the church buildings and this is covered in the five year plan attached to this report. In reality the great majority of major repairs has been done but the major amount of our capital funds has been spent. We as a congregation have to start replenishing the capital funds so that in the years to come the church will have the funds to carry out repairs as needed.

Once again thank you for your support, encouragement and understanding during the past three years because without it, our team of volunteers would not have accomplished what they did. Finally, thank you choosing me over the past three years to be your servant.

CHANGE OF HEART CONTEMPLATIVE EVENING PRAYERS REPORT

What is Contemplative Prayer?

'The root of prayer is interior silence. We may think of prayer as thoughts or feelings expressed in words, but this is only one of its forms. Contemplative Prayer is the opening of mind and heart, body and emotions — our whole being — to God, the Ultimate Mystery, beyond words, thoughts and emotions. Through grace we open our awareness to God whom we know by faith is within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than choosing — closer than consciousness itself.'

History:

The Change of Heart Contemplative Evening Prayer gatherings were initiated in the parish in February 2016, under the leadership of Scott and Miriam Tolhurst, as a weekly Lenten offering on Sunday evenings. By the end of the six weeks, it was apparent that there was a great hunger within many parishioners to continue to grow more deeply in our daily walk with God. In response to an expressed desire for regular opportunities for communal contemplative prayer, it was decided by the group that we would gather twice a month on Sunday evenings for on-going Change of Heart Contemplative Evening Prayers, with continued facilitation by Scott and Miriam. In January 2017, Scott had to step down from his role as Facilitator of Change of Heart as he responded to a call to ministry in Regina.

Leaders:

Since February 2017, Change of Heart Contemplative Evening Prayers have been led by a team of Facilitators. Lynne Hurd, Miriam Tolhurst and I have supported this ministry since its inception. Sandra Lumb joined the Team in September 2018. After prayerful consideration, Miriam stepped down from her Leadership Team responsibilities in January 2018 and Lynne in December 2018. It has been a privilege to follow God's call to guide this ministry over the past two years with these dedicated Facilitators.

Since the commencement of monthly Taize-Style Contemplative Evening Prayers in October 2018, Cecilia Wong, St. Mark's Music Assistant, has graced us with her leadership with the music for these sung prayer gatherings. She has been joined intermittently by St. Mark's Music Director, Emily Worden-Kwok, as well as other musicians.

Gatherings:

In 2018, we offered our Change of Heart Contemplative Evening Prayers in the Family Room twice a month from January to December with a break over July and August. The focus of these evenings has been to gather, as a community, to practice spiritual disciplines such as Chanting, Lectio Divina and Centering Prayer that will open us up to receive the gift of Contemplative Prayer, the gift of God's intimate and loving presence in all of life.

Joining forces with the choir, we also offered a sung, contemplative prayer service in the Sanctuary, with songs from the lona Community in Scotland, on the Wednesday evening of Holy Week. Partnering with the SoulStream Community in May, we provided parishioners with a day-long retreat opportunity to learn about and experience the spiritual practice of walking the Labyrinth as a vessel for contemplative prayer.

On a Feedback Survey in October 2018, one parishioner reflected on the Change of Heart experience: "I have found some peaceful times, opportunities to rest in the mystery and some sympatico companions."

Whether you are new or experienced with contemplative prayer practices, please consider joining us for Evening Prayers in 2019, on the second and fourth Sundays every month in the Family Room at 7pm.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY REPORT

St, Marks Community Outreach Ministry is beginning its 20th year in 2019.

As with all Ministries, we change, we grow, learn and move forward. Your Community Outreach Ministry has changed over the years emerging as one with a strong commitment of giving a 'hand up' to those who need our help. Almost all projects and organizations we support are local and here in the South Surrey area. During this past year, there have been changes in those whom we support, and some we no longer support. All changes made in this Ministry, are led by prayer and guided by a dedicated group of people.

The direction of your Community Outreach Ministry is guided by the Mission Statement taken from St. Matthew, Chapter 25, verses 35 to 40 as follows:

I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me water I was a stranger and you took me in; Naked and you clothed me; ill and you comforted me; In prison and you visited me.
And the King said, "what you do to the least of these my people, you do unto me".

HISTORY

The late Pat Louis, a strong and vibrant parishioner of St. Mark's began this Ministry in early 1999. This Ministry was originally called "The Front Room" in recognition of "The Front Room", which is a homeless shelter in Whalley. This organization supports and assists those who are homeless, mentally ill or struggling with addiction.

This Ministry began with teams making sandwiches in the church kitchen and serving them at the Front Room in Whalley. The Community Outreach Ministry has grown and is now supporting the various organizations and programs outlined in this report.

At the end of that first year, the 'Front Room Ministry' had \$2000 in operating funds. As of 2018, the Community Outreach Ministry supports projects both here in the South Surrey area and at the Front Room in Whalley, and now has an operating budget of \$10,947.19.

LEADERSHIP

The planning and administering of the programs are the responsibility of the Steering Committee which is comprised of members of the congregation: Barbara Grantham (Chair), Pat Aiken, Betty-Ann Bainbridge, Roberta and John Braddock, Lynne Brownridge, Karen Buchanan, Ann Colman, Lawrence Hurd, Peggy Spriggs, Shannon Poulsen, and Darlene Wiegand.

INCOME & EXPENDITURE

The past year's financial support came from the following sources: the Parishioners of St. Mark's, the Ladies Guild, the Sunday School and the Men's Club, along with members of our community who are aware of what St. Marks is committed to and want to support it. The Souper Sunday sales have enabled this Ministry to provide some 'extras' and 'wish list' items for the groups currently supported.

The following financial statement documents funds received and the distribution of these funds to each project. It should be noted that the Community Outreach Ministry operates on a receipts-based reimbursement basis for any and all expenditures.

The Blanche Biddle Fund was created by, guided, and cared for by Alvin Myhre. With Alvin's blessings before his passing this past year, the balance of \$2011.03 was transferred into the Community Outreach General Funds.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS --- 2018

Your Community Outreach Ministry maintains a continued contact with all of the organizations supported through the Ministry. The programs and items donated are reviewed to ensure that what is being provided to each organization is best suited for their current needs. Representatives from these organizations are invited to attend Ministry meetings to discuss their organizations and challenges they face.

Soup Making for Women's Place

Regrettably, we were advised that due to Food Safe Regulations, we were no longer permitted to deliver soup to Women's Place each week. In place of this, monthly funding (65.00) is provided to help defray the costs of preparing these hot lunches. This new initiative is working well. Women's Place continues to serve upwards of 60 women each day for a hot meal at lunch. Thank you to all who donated their time, the preparation and delivery of the soup.

Lunch Basket for Hungry Children

The Lunch Basket for Hungry Children Program helped to support six families in 2018. In 2019 your Outreach Ministry will be able to increase the number of families supported to eight **families** with a total of thirteen children. St. Marks will provide funding to support these **eight** Single Mothers whose children and youth would otherwise go to school hungry. This includes not only single Mothers but a grandmother who cares for her three grandchildren on a full time basis. These families are identified to St. Marks from Women's Place. The participants are all reviewed on a regular basis with Women's Place.

- > Safeway Gift Cards to the value of \$60/child per month and are distributed monthly to young Mothers to purchase food for their children.
- Extra Gift cards valued at \$50 per family are given out for special holidays such as Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas and provided to the families who participate in the Lunch Basket Program for Hungry Children. These families can enjoy some extras at these holiday times as do others in the community.
- Christmas Dinner Gift Cards for Safeway were provided to these families in the Lunch Basket for Hungry Children Program this year. This change was due to special food and diet considerations for the families.
- Christmas Hampers are also provided from various Groups and Bible Studies to those participating in this program.

Financial support for the Lunch Basket is received through contributions made by St. Mark's parishioners. The Donor Pledge Calendar posted in the Parish Hall is where these pledges can be made. It is now suggested a donation of \$60 be pledged. A Thanksgiving or Memorial donation is recognized weekly in the Parish Pulse.

Thank you to Peggy Spriggs, who delivers these Gift cards each month to Women's Place and to Darlene Wiegand who cares for the Lunch Basket Donor Pledge Calendar. Thank you to these ladies for their ongoing effort to keep the program running smoothly.

The Protein Fund

Stan Hodgson, a long time member of St. Marks originated this program to purchase high protein food for those who participate in the 'Lunch Basket' program. Beef, chicken and pork and other high protein foods are purchased with donations received from within the parish. These 'Protein' packets are made up by Penguin Meats and delivered to Women's Place each month.

Thank you to Roberta Braddock for her dedicated time and organization of this program.

Christmas Hampers

Each year, those families who are participants of the Lunch Basket Program and The Protein Fund receive Christmas Hampers. These Hampers are organized by the Outreach Ministry and supplied by The Sunday School, Ladies Guild, ACW, Men's Club, Bible Studies, Savvy Seniors and the Outreach Ministry itself. Gift Cards are given early in December, so that the parents have the opportunity to purchase gifts for their children, and food for their Christmas dinners.

Thank you to Ann Colman for organizing and delivering these gift cards.

Launching Pad

The Launching Pad Addiction Rehabilitation Society is a non-profit organization offering programs which lead men to achieve and maintain sobriety. Located here in South Surrey, the programs offered here help men to maintain sobriety, to improve their level of physical, mental and spiritual health. The residents become accountable, self-reliant and responsible.

The vegetables from the Altar at Thanksgiving were donated to the Launching Pad.

Stepping Stones

Stepping Stones is a non-profit organization which welcomes all pregnant and parenting youth between the ages of 12 and 24. Most of these young parents come from unsupportive homes and have nowhere to turn for support. These young Moms are faced with overwhelming odds and challenges. Young Mothers, and now Young Fathers, attend programs to improve their circumstances.

Monthly funding was provided to Stepping Stones for young Mothers to purchase bus tickets so that these young parents can attend workshops and support groups at this non-profit organization

Funds were also donated from the Souper Sunday sales for the Annual Family Christmas Party for those who are supported through this organization.

AMA Transition House

AMA Transition House is the first transition house of its kind in Canada. Accessible to women 55+ who are experiencing abuse – AMA House serves a community where the number of seniors per capita is twice the national average. There are no geographical limitations for access. This 'First Stage' residential care home provides immediate assistance to Senior Women in need.

Monthly funding provides bus tickets and personal items for women who are residents of AMA House.

Thank you to Isabel Powell for her continued support with the purchase and donations of the many pairs of socks for the women at AMA House.

Funding to Purchase Fresh Vegetables

As in the previous years, \$100 each quarter was sent to both Women's Place and the South Surrey Food Bank. The funds are designated for fresh vegetables. This program was originated to replace the fresh vegetables delivered from A Rocha. The funding enables both the Food Bank and Women's Place to purchase vegetables on a regular basis at a reasonable price.

'Souper' Sunday 2018

Again in 2018 Souper Sunday was a wonderful success. During this past year we have been blessed with the ongoing donation of all of our soup making supplies. This has enabled your Outreach Ministry to donate the total profits from the sale of the soup to the designated recipient.

The Committee members meet on the Saturday to prepare soup for Sunday morning sales. We have great choppers, mixers and sellers that all enable this program to be so successful. This homemade soup is for sale after both the 8am and 10am services.

The 'Souper Sunday' project has been able to assist in purchasing and delivering items on 'wish lists' to the following organizations:

AMA House

\$400 was spent to purchase pajamas and slippers which were donated to AMA for the new residents at the house.

Launching Pad

Purchase of a rice maker, and other kitchen equipment which are always in great need for the kitchen which serves all the meals to the young men.

Stepping Stones

Funding was provided for the Annual Christmas Dinner to purchase 'wish list' items for these young parents and their extended families. 200 people attended this dinner.

South Surrey/White Rock Food Bank

Again this year, all soup sales for January were donated to the Food Bank -- as this month is one of the slower donation months of the year.

Thank you to Roberta Braddock for shopping for all of the soup supplies and organizing the soup preparation in the kitchen.

CREATION CARE MINISTRY REPORT

Thank you to all who continue to work as a faith community to fulfill our Baptismal Covenant with God to "...safeguard the integrity of God's creation, and respect, sustain and renew the earth." Thank you to all of you who have so faithfully worked to maintain the beauty and the safety of the gardens and the forest at the Parish of St. Mark and to literally keep tons of metal from entering the landfill while we work to streamline all recycling on this 3 acre site.

In 2018 the drip irrigation system in the rose/dahlia bed and to the hanging baskets was completed to both reduce the amount of water required. The work is less labour intensive and the tripping hazard of hoses on the sidewalks in the courtyard should be eliminated. All gardens are now on timed irrigation and drop systems.

While the challenges of a changing climate, very wet springs followed by these past two years of drought-like summers and other factors meant that the western red cedars saplings that the children planted in 2016 did not survive; the children planted new hedging that will be transplanted in time to replace a massive tinder-dry dead cedar hedge that was removed by the Tuesday morning work crew. St. Mark's forest and grounds will require diligence to reduce the hazard of fire.

The expense for preventive management of the forest will continue as the City of Surrey not only requires permits to remove dead trees but also the cost of the city's dictated replacement trees that are monitored for two years.

We've worked with our neighbours in the process of removing further dead trees in 2018. On December 22 some of the Tuesday morning work crew met with a professional surveyor to locate the iron pins that mark our property boundaries. With this work done, our property lines will soon be visibly marked and this will greatly facilitate all future work and discussions with the City of Surrey and our neighbours.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

"Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." 2 Corinthians 9:7

The Financial Stewardship Team had a busy and successful year. Our mandate is to encourage "giving regularly and significantly, depending on your means". To support this, the committee developed various initiatives in 2018, including:

1) Pre-authorized Donation (PAD): PAD is the preferred method of giving, since donations are consistent and predictable, which provides stability and security for the church's finances. 2018 saw an increase of 22 PAD donors, to a total of \$14,983 monthly. This equates to an increase in PAD of \$4,254 per month, over 2017. As of January 2019, we have five additional PAD contributors.

2) <u>Financial Statistics:</u> We regularly receive financial updates in the Parish Pulse showing our income and expenses vs. budget. A request was made to provide more details regarding the size categories of donations vs. what it costs per person to run the church. These statistics were provided near the end of 2018 and the response was overwhelmingly positive. One of the committee's values is transparency, so this is an important statistic to share with our Parish. The chart published is below:

3) <u>Electronic Donation Station:</u> On November 25, 2018 the Electronic Donation Station (EDS) was launched as another method of giving. The interest shown and response to this project since Day One has been overwhelmingly positive. As of the first week of January, thirty-six (36) people used the station, donating \$7,597. Many comments came from all age groups, including:

"This is going to work. Anything I can do so I don't have to carry cash is wonderful" (Senior) "Can I use my debit card? I'd like to donate some of my allowance to the church." (Child)

We are excited to offer electronic giving, in addition to regular Envelopes and PAD. It is designed especially for visitors and those wishing to make additional donations above their usual form of giving.

Given its successful launch, the EDS is now part of the 'fabric' of the church, so going forward all clergy, wardens and ministry leaders are responsible for ensuring the station is open and ready for all services (including weddings and funerals) and events that sell tickets. The committee encourages all leaders to take ownership and associate the Electronic Donation Station with their ministry.

TREASURER'S REPORT

2018 had its usual cash flow challenges, slowly improving in the last quarter. Income was consistently above the prior July to November. I think this can be attributed to the work of the Financial Stewardship Committee and the increase in PAD Donors which has made a difference. It was also a busy year with the many capital works accomplishments. Our continued gratitude and thanks go to our volunteers and illustrious leader, Ken Miles for their dedication in these projects.

The Operating Fund Financial Statements for the year ending December 31, 2018, reflects our commitment and steadfastness.

Total Contributions and Revenues - \$389,223.66
 Total Expenses - \$383,833.74
 Net Surplus - \$5,389.92

I appreciate and thank every ministry and their leaders for their good financial stewardship. In addition to the operating contributions and revenue, we also received \$5,445.00 in Capital Funds, \$53,424.30 in contributions to Community Outreach, Syrian Family Sponsorship, PWRDF and other ministries

This is not including funds raised by ACW, Ladies Guild and Men's Club – as always, well done good and faithful servants! The Parish of St. Mark - Ocean Park is richly blessed by your love and faithfulness of the countless hours of "Time and Talent" to which many, many volunteers so willingly and faithfully contribute. I cannot say this too often. For this, we give God all the praise and glory!

Total GIC Investments at year end is \$292,071.57. It was necessary to redeem GICs in the amount of \$65,000.00 to provide the cash flow for the capital projects done during the year. Capital expenses of \$68,134.59 was disbursed for Roofing Project, Replacement of Emergency Exit Stairs, Refrigeration Refurbishment, Arborist for Back Forest Area, New Projection Screen and various improvements.

Thank you to those that have their contributions processed by P.A.D. (pre-authorized donations). This is especially helpful with cash flow management in the summer months. Please consider signing up if you have not already done so.

Nancy Rickett of McDonald Rickett, Chartered Accountants has performed a "Review Engagement" for the year ended December 31, 2018 as required by the Charities Act. Her Review Engagement Report is included in the Annual Report with the Financial Reports.

A very heartfelt thank you to Sheila Johnston for her help and support with data entry, to the Donation Secretary, Kathy Chambers and support from the Financial Stewardship Team, also the Clergy, Wardens and Trustees for your input and encouragement.

A special thank you to the Prayer Shield Team who covers us in prayer as we meet and seek God's will for the Parish. The Lord's guidance and presence is very much felt in these meetings.

The budget for 2019 reflects a realistic assessment of the expected operating costs of the Parish as we know them. Again, this year we have added a Contingency component for the unexpected and unknowns. It is our goal to reflect budget and ministry costs as accurately and transparently as possible while providing for the well being of the growth and development of the parish.

Notes to the Financial Statement and Budget

Cash:

Our ending cash balance is \$\$54,771.94, which is adequate for the monthly cash flow and payables in the first quarter.

Investments:

The yearend balance of \$292,071.57 for Investments represent "Trust Funds" for Ministry Programs, Youth and Children's Ministries, Bequests and Capital Funds and Operating Surplus. At the 2018 yearend, our surplus operating funds are \$21,198.49. During the year \$65,000.00 of our investments were redeemed to finance the Capital Projects.

Receivables:

P.A.D. (Pre-Authorized Deposits) Receivable of \$14,893.00 is applied to our monthly remittance to the Diocese for payroll and the Diocesan Assessment, reducing our monthly cash payment. GST Receivable of \$2,292.23 is the expected refund for 2018.

Accrued Interest of \$2,040.70 – is interest earned to December 31, 2018 on the GICs.

Fixed Assets:

Changes in Church Buildings and Improvements are the additions of Capital Improvements less depreciation for the year. As a note of interest, on the 2019 Property Assessment Notice, the Assessed Value is \$7,700,900.

Liabilities:

Accrued Accounts Payables are the Year End Accounting fees of \$3,675.00, Damage Deposit of \$1,625.00 for the Rectory and \$1,100.00 deposits for Funeral Services.

Fund Balances:

By reviewing the Report of Fund Balances, one can clearly see the Fund Activity for the year. The Balances brought forward from prior year is Opening Balance, Total Income and Total Expenses for the year giving the Closing Balance of each Fund and Ministry at year end.

Income:

Contributions for 2018 decreased marginally by \$470.78, and the Revenue decreased by \$7,226.04. Total Income for the year was \$389,223.66.

Expenses:

Operating and Ministry Expenses were below budget for the year. Total expenses were \$383,833.74 resulting in a **SURPLUS** of **\$5,389.92**.

Budget 2019

The proposed 2019 budget for Income Required has remained the same as 2017. Although there is a cost of living increase in staff salaries and two proposed staff increases, the reduction in the Diocese Assessment and Clergy staff have compensated for these costs. Expenses have been analyzed to reflect the realistic cost of operations with a contingency factor of \$10,000. Therefore, the amount of Contributions required by parishioners has not increased for the operation of the parish.

This Budget was reviewed and endorsed by Finance Committee and Parish Council for presentation for approval at Vestry.

FIVE YEAR CAPITAL BUDGET PLANNING REPORT

This is a plan to attempt to provide a guesstimate of funds that will be required over the next five years for our building and the forest out back beginning in the year 2019. This is a dynamic plan and as such some years might change along with planned costs.

Equipment replacement or renovations that have been done in the last 9 to 10 years have not been considered as part of this plan as their lifetime should exceed the time period of this plan.

However, before attempting a plan of this magnitude, it should be remembered that there are certain items that, if they failed, would result in a shutdown of some or all facilities. These items have been identified and funds reserved for this possibility.

These items are as follows:

- Two of the three furnaces in the Hall are in the range of 16 years of age (I have been led to believe that one furnace was replaced recently and thus the remaining two are approaching the end of their useful life. Both furnaces appear identical and at \$8000 a furnace a total of \$16,000 should be allotted. It should be noted that it might be possible to combine two furnaces into one and this should be investigated over the next year.
- 2) There is one small hot water tank in the building and it is at least 7 years old and \$1,000 should be allowed for replacement. - Insurance does not cover tanks over 12 years old.
- 3) In the Christian Education Center, there is a heat exchanger which produces the heat for the center. If this were to fail, there would be no heat for the Sunday School. Cost of replacement \$7,000.
- 4) The steel roof over the Sanctuary should have its bolts tightened sometime in the next ten years. To do this should cost approximately \$30,000. However there is a condition, and that is if the bolts will not tighten, the steel will have to be removed, new wood installed and the cladding reinstalled. This will be a very expensive operation and probably cost around \$100,000 and possibly more. This \$100,000 will not be used in this report but it is something we should consider at some time over the next five years.

All remaining critical pieces of equipment (except the kitchen freezer) that have been replaced or renovated over the last six years should have a useful life with proper maintenance exceeding the five year scope of this plan. The above four items total \$53,000. It would be unrealistic to assume that all will fail in one year. Therefore it is recommended that \$30,000 be reserved for emergencies. This money is in excess of the money for the five year plan.

FIVE YEAR CAPITAL BUDGET PLAN

Year 2019

Reroof Rectory - \$14,000

Replace carpeting in the Hall between the Hall itself and the choir rooms with either tile, or laminate \$15,000 Repairs to Sanctuary: Repair cracked window - \$500, Repair and/or improve lighting \$1,200. Install anti-draft vent closers - \$1500

Total Sanctuary \$3,200.

Install new kitchen fan for dishwasher - \$500

Year 2020

Replace all carpeting in the choir room, choir director's office and Family Room with either laminate or carpet - \$12,000

Year 2021

Paint the outside of the buildings, re shingle the south side of the Hall - \$25,000

Year 2021

Renew the two furnaces only if required – \$12,000
Replace carpet in Christian Education Centre - \$14,000

Year 2022

Tighten the bolts on the roof - \$25,000. If the furnace items for year 2021 are not required move this item into the year 2021.

5 Year Budget Consideration for St. Mark's Back Forest

There are several factors at play in projecting an estimated cost for a preventive approach to managing the health and safety of the forested area of St. Mark's.

- i) There was no oversight of the forest for (30+ years) until 2015
- ii) Climatic changes in the past 2 years have greatly increased the fire hazard of accumulated debris on the forest floor & further changes in extremes are predicted
- iii) The City of Surrey governs all tree removals and the replanting of designated species through an expensive process of permits, deposits and the monitoring of replacement trees. Their process has become increasingly stringent over the past 10 years and most often requires the consultation of an arborist
- iv) While there are some able-bodied and available volunteer parishioners and the semi-annual clean-up contract with our Scout Group; most of the forest maintenance clean-up of the forest has been done at no cost to the Parish
- v) The recent marking of Parish property boundaries will now allow improved communication with our neighbours and facilitate any action to prevent illegal cutting of trees or dumping on site.
- vi)

Our best estimate of the cost of managing the forest given the above would be \$3,000 per year with 10% annual increase. In addition to this any increases in City Fees would have to be factored in, as would a reduction of Parish volunteers or the loss of assistance by the Scouts.

The 20th annual Journey of Christmas was memorable for the celebration service and themed meal, two nights closed to a power outage and great attendance after the emergency closures. This year, volunteers signed up quicker than ever to ensure that we had full coverage every night including our busiest night, Christmas Eve. 146 visitors came through on Christmas Eve, which is the best attendance for that night in years. We had 538 visitors and there were lots of positives to carry us forward. I want to thank the volunteers, especially my wife Barb for her support, keeping me on task so that we can open on time.

Our wonderful Arts Showcase brought the Christmas spirit through music every night. The variety of the music being offered is a credit to the arts community in this region of the Lower Mainland.

We publicized through Facebook, the Parish & Diocesan websites. Our visitors found other websites by googling "Journey of Christmas" or "Christmas displays." We gave out 250 posters. Tracy Holmes of the Peace Arch News wrote an inspiring article promoting our 20th year.

Tom Zytarek toured "Journey of Christmas" on Dec. 22 and wrote about our message in the Christmas Eve edition of the Surrey Now-Leader and Peace Arch News. Tom "plagiarized" himself from an article that he found in the Hall that he wrote 19 years ago. We gave out over 250 posters beginning with the Holly Berry Fair.

This is the last year that I chaired the "Journey of Christmas" after 12 years at the helm and the only original member left from the committee that launched it in 1999.

I addressed Parish Council on Tue. Jan. 22 to look at ways to move this Christmas tradition forward. We have to approach the future with open minds.

KITCHEN COMMITTEE REPORT

St. Mark's kitchen has been very well used over the 2018 calendar year. We thank all users for following the guidelines that are mounted on the wall above the sink area. As we all learned in the food safe course the best sanitizing practice is to wipe all counters down with bleach or Lysol wipes at the end of each cleaning. We appreciate your vigilance in this procedure.

A cleaning company, Simply Spotless, comes in twice a year to power clean the hood, fan and vents. This cleaning schedule is required by law twice a year. The approximate cost is \$900 per year.

Fraser Valley Fire Protection is scheduled to do routine checks several times a year of the church and kitchen. The average cost of their inspection is \$1,100 per year. This is required by law.

The pantry continues to be a very integral part of our kitchen. Most large or seldom used items are stored on well-marked shelving in the pantry. Please continue to return clean items to this storage space. Any fabric or plastic items are stored in marked bins to prevent the access of silverfish and other creatures.

Several items have been purchased for use in the food service areas: new coloured cutting boards, storage bins, tablecloths, water pitchers, trivets, etc.

Food Safe level one was offered at St Marks in September. The church education fund payed for 25 parishioners to take this course. We are required to have one person with current food safe qualifications in the kitchen at all times food is being prepared. These high standards enable our kitchen to run efficiently.

We are pleased with the cooperation provided by each of our user groups. We thank you for your support in this hospitality ministry.

Changes made this last year involved removal of the small white speakers in the sanctuary because they were causing echo; purchase of a new, larger screen for the Hall; and donation by Don Hamilton of a newer television for the Hall.

This coming year we may have to replace the projector which is old and technologically dated, although as long as the bulb lasts, we will continue to use it.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL (VBS) REPORT

This year, we had not only returning "campers" but many new and younger ones in attendance. This augurs well for continued growth and viability for the VBS Outreach Program, as it goes forward.

A few observations that I can make, based on my own perception and interaction, are offered. This being the second year of my "appearance" on the stage might account for it, but I felt that the campers got into the spirit of things much quicker, with song participation and enthusiasm. Although younger, it seemed a good mix and it was good to see the older "more experienced" campers helping the younger ones. As well they were "eager" to participate although at their younger age, tended to become shy after the initial burst!

I cannot take credit for this. I think the adult and junior leaders were fantastic in shepherding their groups and participating in the motivation of their campers.

The music really caught on – now whether this was their youthful enthusiasm or the calibre of the music is moot – they enjoyed it! Of note is that they liked songs that I was less enthused about, so be wary of being too "adult orientated!" [Lesson learned!]

I had one parent, with 2 new children, say to me how happy she was to find the VBS program – which had been at her church but discontinued! Her kids enjoyed it and they took some of the props for use at a birthday party! I remark on this because my estimate is that less than 50% (even as low as 40%) of the children were regular or from families who regularly attend at St. Mark's. So this is a tremendously successful outreach program for us to be enthused about. Our timing is good in that we are able to utilize materials from other VBS programs in the Peninsula. Further promoting a vibrant Christian fellowship. We had props from both Star of the Sea (Catholic) and White Rock Baptist – for which I am very appreciative.

The success of the VBS program remains our volunteer staffing. We should anticipate continued growth and participation. This I would base on the fact that Linda Zeal built the reputation for 9 years of the VBS and, as would be expected, last year we saw a substantial reduction in numbers with a new "unknown director". But the rebound and increase in "campers" this year suggests that we can anticipate that the numbers Linda was getting (over 70) will be reached in short order. As indicated above, the youthfulness of the participants augurs well for returning to the VBS in 2019!

On last comment: one camper when seeing me prepare for the final day "experiment" remarked, "Oh like last year when you had the stuff foam all over?!"

We don't necessarily recognized what is important for the children but I perceive more recognition from the children of who I am than I did last year. That I was unknown then and am more so now, or that I murdered the pronunciation of Toucans and Sloths ... remains to be concluded!

YOUTH MINISTRY REPORT

Another year of ministry has flown by, and the one constant is always our mission to develop disciples of Jesus Christ. It's a blessing to be able to do this in community while having a great time together!

On Sundays, we regularly reflected on the weekly Gospel lesson through our *ReThink Sunday* classes while spending time in prayer and worship. This Fall we also focused our time on the life of Christ through an animated film which helped bring Jesus' ministry to life. We are also proud of our students who were involved in the intercessory prayer team, music, Eucharistic, and readers' ministries, and leading the children in Sunday School and VBS. Our *Thrive Tuesday* meetings had new life this year as we welcomed five new students who moved up from the Sunday School program, along with new families that have joined us at St. Mark's. On Tuesdays it's always fun to look forward to worship through song, prayer, and enjoy each other's company through games and activities (some this year included Spoons, Bucketball, Pie in the Face, Pumpkin Carving, Gingerbread House Contest, board games and more). Early in the year we started our Bible study all the way at the beginning with the Book of Genesis and ended with an in-depth look at the Book of James. Special guests this year included Barb Walks who gave us a fascinating presentation on her mission's trip to Rwanda, as well as David Soy who shared his experience in prison ministry and gave us the opportunity to write cards to prisoners. Each quarter we continued to help with St. Mark's commitment to the Adopt-a-Street program.

Breakout Events are events focused on building a sense of community through fun activities. This year we went paintballing and lazer tagging, hosted movie nights, enjoyed pizza on the beach, played board games, watched a meteor shower, enjoyed chocolate fondue, and went to the BC Lions Faith and Family night. A highlight again was our annual Christmas bowling party at Sandcastle Lanes followed by a gift exchange.

As James reminds us (James 1:5), let's ask God for true wisdom to live out the Gospel in our everyday lives, that we may be as Christ to our neighbours and an example of true faith. Continue to pray for our students and their families as we enter a new season of ministry together – we appreciate your loving support.
